FORMING CONSCIENCES FOR FAITHFUL CITIZENSHIP

With the upcoming election season, we would like to share a document by the USCCB that discusses, "A Call to Political Responsibility from the Catholic Bishops of the United States."

To quote from the introductory letter:

"As Catholics, we bring the richness of our faith to the public square. We draw from both faith and reason as we seek to affirm the dignity of the human person and the common good of all. With renewed hope, we, the Catholic Bishops of the United States, are re-issuing Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, our teaching document on the political responsibility of Catholics, which provides guidance for all who seek to exercise their rights and duties as citizens.

"Everyone living in this country is called to participate in public life and contribute to the common good.

In Rejoice and Be Glad [Gaudete et Exsultate], Pope Francis writes:

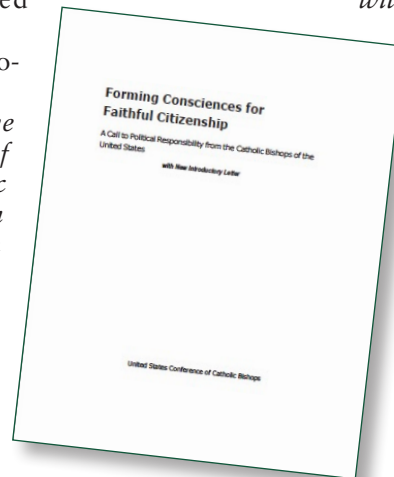
"Your identification with Christ and his will involves a commitment to build with him that kingdom of love,

justice and universal peace. . . . You cannot grow in holiness without committing yourself, body and soul, to giving your best to this endeavor.

"The call to holiness, he writes, requires a "firm and passionate" defense of "the innocent unborn." "Equally sacred," he further states, are "the lives of the poor, those already born, the destitute, the abandoned and the underprivileged, the

vulnerable infirm and elderly exposed to covert euthanasia, the victims of human trafficking, new forms of slavery, and every form of rejection."

FEAST OF ST. FRANCIS

This weekend we celebrate the Feast of St. Francis by singing two very familiar songs, “Prayer of St. Francis” and “Canticle of the Sun” which epitomize the life and teachings of this beloved Saint.

Prayer of St. Francis

The song “Prayer of St. Francis,” is one of the most well-known songs in our Catholic repertoire. It was composed in 1967 by Sebastian Temple, shortly after Vatican II encouraged singing in the vernacular rather than in traditional Latin. Over the years, it has become a popular choice for funerals—perhaps most remembered at the funeral of Princess Diana who considered it one of her favorite songs.

Although the title implies the prayer was written by St. Francis, the reality is that it was first published anonymously in 1912 in France, in a spiritual magazine called “La Clochette” (The Little Bell). It was first attributed to St. Francis in 1927, was eventually translated into English and became more popular worldwide by people of all faiths.

While St. Francis of Assisi did not actually write this prayer, he was known to faithfully live out the principles in it – with humility, kindness and compassion. The song “Prayer of St. Francis,” sums up what St. Francis was all about – and perhaps now more than ever, it is a timeless reminder of how we ought to live our life here on this earth.

Canticle of the Sun

Based upon St. Francis’s prayer, “Canticle of the Creatures,” one of the most recognized hymns in the Catholic liturgy is Marty Haugen’s, “Canticle of the Sun.” Other well-known adaptations include William Henry Draper’s Easter hymn “All Creatures of Our God and King” and arrangements by classical

composers Franz Liszt, Carl Off, and others.

St. Francis wrote “Canticle of the Creatures” in 1224, as a kind of synthesis of his journey to God through the beauty of creation. Throughout his life, St. Francis discovered in himself that his

view of God was not myopic. In fact, the more he experienced both joy and suffering throughout his journey, the more he realized the “relatedness” of all creation to God. St. Francis reminds us that we, as humans, are as dependent on the elements of creation as they are dependent

on us. He had a deep respect for creatures of all kinds, referring to them as his “sisters” and “brothers.” Indeed, St. Francis believed that he was part of a “cosmic” family of creation with God at the helm.

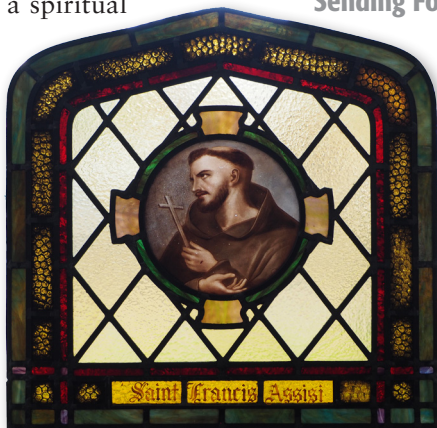
Sending Forth

This week, our Sending Forth hymn is “Canticle of the Sun.” Why do we refer to the closing song as the Sending Forth hymn? In short, the word “Mass” comes from the Latin word, “Missa.” When the Mass was said in Latin, it was concluded with the words “Ite, missa

est,” which literally means “Go, you are sent.” Thus, we believe that the liturgy does not simply come to an end when Mass is over. We are literally sent forth to bring the fruits of the Eucharist and spread the Gospel out into the world. May we go forth today in joyful song and praise to all God’s creation!

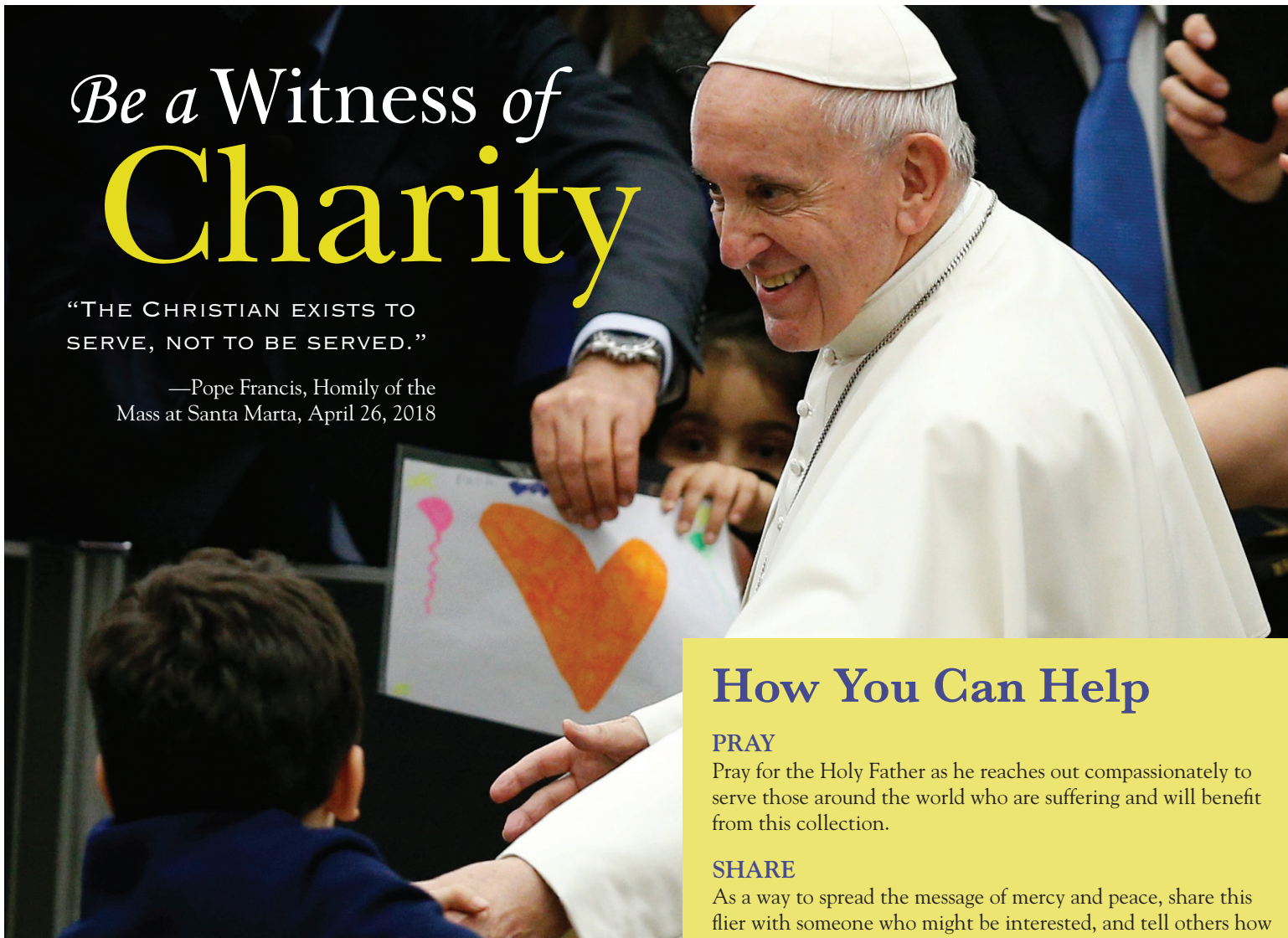

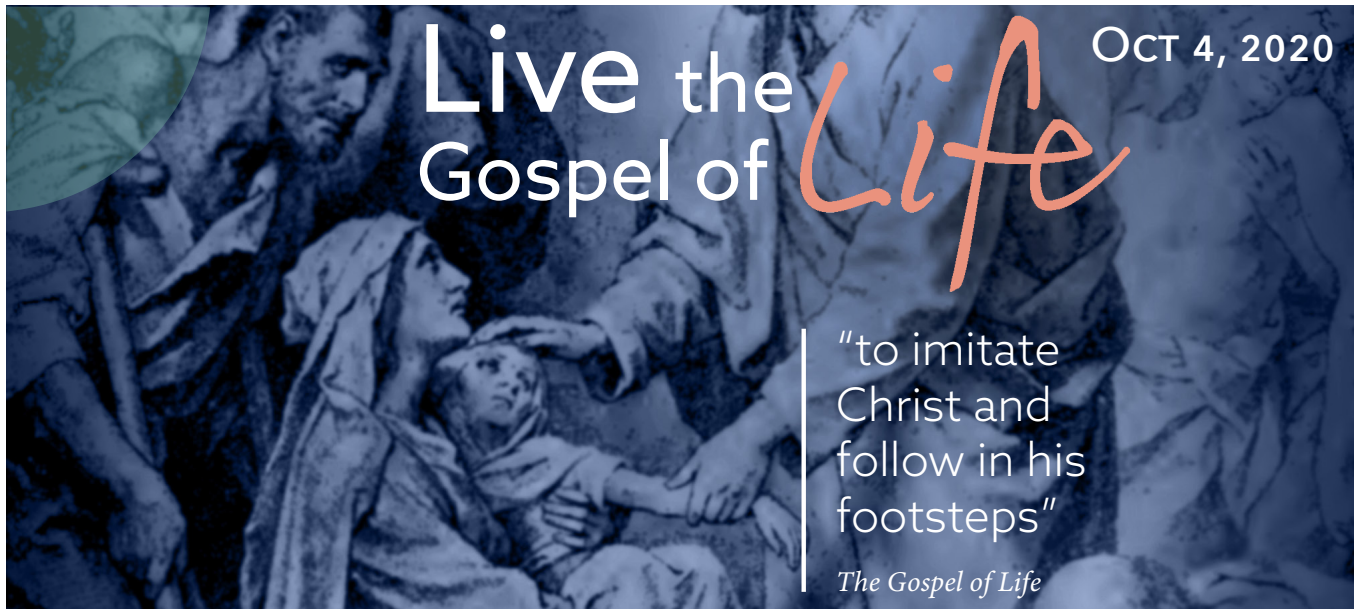

LIVE THE GOSPEL OF LIFE

“to imitate Christ and follow in his footsteps”

The Gospel of Life 51

Twenty-five years ago, Pope St. John Paul II wrote that the Gospel of life is at the *heart* of Jesus’ saving message to the world (*Evangelium vitae* 1). In taking on human flesh, dwelling among us, and sacrificing his very life for our redemption, Christ reveals the profound dignity of *every* human person. This God-given dignity does not change with our stage of life, abilities, level of independence, or any other varying circumstance.

Rather, it is rooted in the permanent fact that each of us is made in the image and likeness of God, created to share in the very life of God himself. The human person is a “manifestation of God in the world, a sign of his presence, a trace of his glory” (EV 34). And we must reflect this truth in how we act and how we treat one another.

The truth of the Gospel of life is at the foundation of who we are as followers of Christ. In his earthly life, Jesus provided the perfect model for how we are to love our neighbor and live out the Gospel call: “Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me” (Mt. 25:40).

Jesus calls each of us to “care for the other as a person for whom God has made us responsible” (EV 87). The Gospel of life is intrinsic to the whole Christian life and foundational to the decisions we make on a daily basis. For, “the Gospel of God’s love for man, the Gospel of the dignity of the person and

the Gospel of life are a *single and indivisible* Gospel” (EV 2, emphasis added).

In his encyclical on the Gospel of life, Pope St. John Paul II recognizes the full range of threats against human life, from poverty and malnutrition to murder and war. He places particular emphasis, however, on threats to life at its beginning and end—precisely when it is most in need of protection. In modern times, children in their mothers’ wombs and those approaching the end of their lives are certainly among the “least of these” in our world’s estimation. Practices such as abortion and assisted suicide tragically reject the truth that human life is always to be cherished and defended with loving concern.

As the Church celebrates the 25th anniversary of Pope St. John Paul II’s prophetic encyclical, let us reflect on how we personally live out the Gospel: *Do I talk about and act towards others as I would talk about and treat Jesus himself? Do I inform myself of the Church’s teachings and engage in the civic arena as first a follower of Christ? Do I support and advocate for laws and policies that protect and defend human life? Do I help pregnant and parenting mothers in need? Am I ready to support a loved one nearing death?*

Through the intercession of Our Lady of Guadalupe, may Our Lord grant us the grace to truly and courageously live his Gospel of life.

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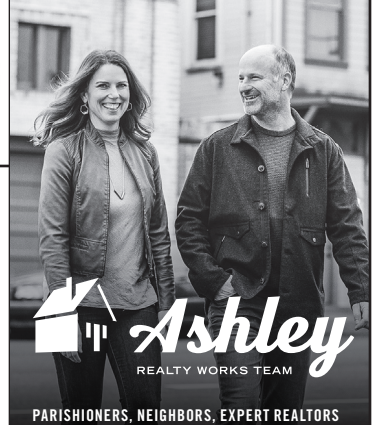
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
