FROM THE MYSTERY OF FAITH TO THE LITANY OF SAINTS

The Mystery of Faith (Mysterium fidei)

Unlike the other parts of the Mass that we sing, the origin and purpose of the Mystery of Faith in the Mass is somewhat ambiguous. The expression itself is non-biblical and appears to have been added in some form to the prayers of consecration by Pope Saint Leo the Great in the sixth century. However, after much debate it was removed from the consecration rites when the new (old) rites were initiated. In 1969, Pope Paul VI intervened and made it a separate introduction to an acclamation by the congregation. Confused? It gets better!

The congregation has the option of one of three revised acclamations. All three are rooted in Scripture. Option A, and especially option B, are derived from 1 Cor 11:26 – “For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes.” And option C is found in Jn 4:42, when the woman who met Jesus at the well is told by her fellow Samaritans, “we know that this is truly the savior of the world.” Now, for those of you who paid attention, there used to be a fourth option, “Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again.” Since no one seems to know how that one came to be, it was dropped in 2010 with the NEW translation of the Order of the Mass. Also during that time, the expression by the priest, “let us proclaim the mystery of faith” simply became, “the mystery of faith.” Whew – that seems complicated! For our purposes, we will be learning the second option from the Mass of St. Mary Magdalene, which says, “When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup, we proclaim your Death, O Lord, until you

come again.”

The Litany of the Saints

Also this weekend, we begin our month long tradition of singing The Litany of the Saints as we remember all those that have died in our Parish and in our world. The Litany of the Saints is one of the oldest Catholic prayers that is still in use, dating back to the fifth and sixth centuries. Typically, it consists of the chanting of the saint’s name and the congregational response, “pray for us.” So that we don’t leave anyone out, we also include the response, “all you holy men and women, pray for us” at its conclusion.

Communion of Saints

As Catholics, we believe in the communion of saints as a spiritual connection between the living and the dead. In short, “we are all in this together.” What that means is that we spend a good deal of time praying for those who have died, both at every Mass and even on our own for specific causes (have you ever prayed to St. Anthony when you lost something?) This includes not just the 10,000 recognized saints in the Church, but all those in our own personal lives that have gone before us. Of course, we are comforted in the belief that they, in turn, are praying and watching out for us still here on earth. In the words of St. Therese of Lisieux, “When I die, I will send down a shower of roses from the heavens, I will spend my heaven by doing good on earth.”

All Souls

CRISP AUTUMN chill penetrates our sweater-wrapped bodies to remind us of our weakness before the power of nature. As leaves fall from trees, plants die, and animals retreat, we feel the impending threat of death, which waits to take us home.

During this season of the northern hemisphere's year, the Church celebrates the Commemoration of All Souls. As our bodies and minds resign themselves to the inevitable cessation of life, our Church calendar brings forth a somber feast to fit our temperament these increasingly darkened days.

All Souls comes as a sequel to that of All Saints. Having commemorated all the blessed who enjoy the face of God in their death, we turn our thoughts to the other souls who await the fullness of God's glory. The sequence of these two days implies a belief that those who have lived lives of holiness enjoy God's presence and can intercede for us before the throne of God. All Souls implies that others, having lived more sinful lives, still await that glory. These are the dead we remember every November 2—members of our families, friends, the lonely and forgotten, and public figures who have touched our lives. On this day, we pray that God will have mercy on them and grant them the vision of blessedness for which they longed.

The liturgy for this day still offers three Masses. When the Church created this feast in the Middle Ages, it became so popular that priests were given the unusual permission to celebrate three Masses that day. The permission remains, as do the separate texts for the Masses, even though not every parish takes advantage of the permission. The readings are drawn from the collection of texts we use for funerals.

When the Church gathers for prayer on November 2, we still remember the faithful departed, even when it falls on a Sunday. Those who assisted us in life receive assistance from us in their death. This commemoration celebrates our union with the church in every place and beyond all time.

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The Solemnity of All Saints

NOVEMBER 1, 2020

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints.

All Hallows' Day, the Solemnity of All Saints, or All Saints' Day is a celebration of all Catholic saints held on November 1 each year. "On this solemnity, we recall the holy men and women who, having completed their earthly journeys, now live forever with God. These saints, though not canonized, offer us models of abiding faith and love of God and neighbor" (Essential Guide to Seasons and Saints, 109).

In the Catholic Church, we are called to imitate and venerate saints because of their heroically virtuous lives, martyrdom, or their offering of life for others. But, what does veneration mean and why do we pray to the saints?

Veneration of the saints fosters our faith in God and does not detract from it. Rather, our faith in God is strengthened by our relationship with our brothers and sisters in the faith who are in heaven. The Church teaches that by imitating the virtues lived by the saints, the saints bring us closer to Christ. When we ask the saints to pray for us, we ask them to join their wills with the will of God and intercede for us here on earth. This is the Communion of Saints which we profess every Sunday in the Creed. In his homily on the Solemnity of All Saints in 2015, Pope Francis said,

Let us ask the Lord for the grace to be simple and humble people, the grace to be able to weep, the grace to be meek, the grace to work for justice and peace, and above all the grace to let ourselves be forgiven by God so as to become instruments of his mercy.

This is what the Saints did, those who have preceded us to our heavenly home. They accompany us on our earthly pilgrimage, they encourage us to go forward. May their intercession help us to walk on Jesus' path, and to obtain eternal happiness for our deceased brothers and sisters, for whom we offer this Mass.

November 1-7 is National Vocations Awareness Week!

We pray for all those discerning their vocations as holy priests, deacons and consecrated men and women.

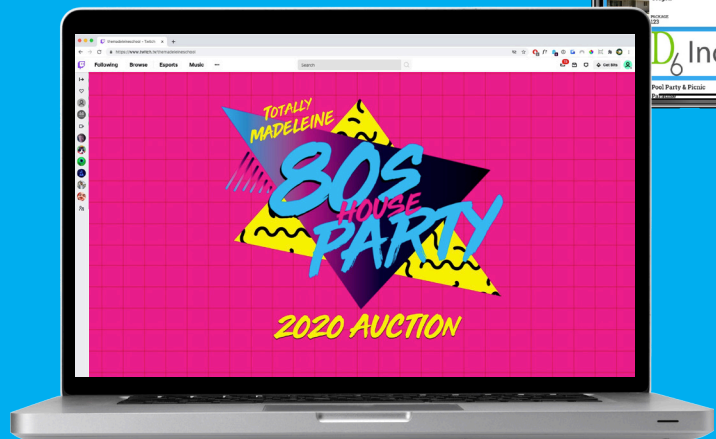
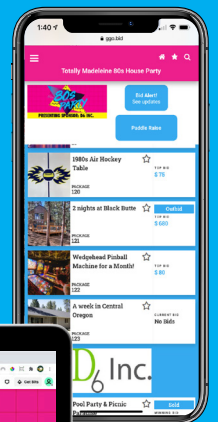

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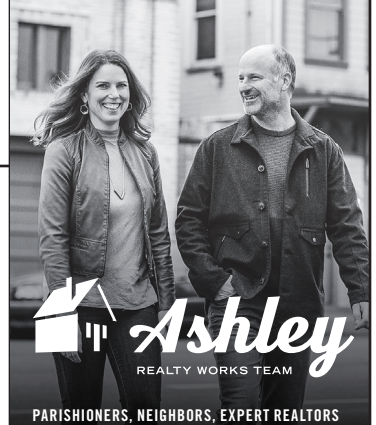
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
