Virtual retreat with composer Dan Schutte

Join us for a special Virtual Retreat featuring legendary Catholic musician Dan Schutte – one of the best-known and most influential composers of Catholic music for liturgy in the English-speaking world.

Dan's theological training includes Jesuit formation and two master's degrees – in theology and liturgy respectively – from the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, California. In addition, he has three honorary doctoral degrees for his contribution to the life of the Church. Currently, Dan is composer-in-residence at the University of San Francisco.

As a musician, some of his most celebrated songs—“Here I Am, Lord,” “City of God” and “Sing a New Song”—are from his years of collaboration with the St. Louis Jesuits. These songs, and many others, are truly part of the life-blood of Catholic repertoire in the post-Vatican II age. To honor that legacy, in 2017 OCP released the 40th anniversary edition of *Earthen Vessels*, as well as a beautifully remixed and remastered commemorative edition of their classic Christmas album, *Gentle Night*.

While Dan has served as liturgist and music director in various pastoral and academic settings, he spends a significant amount of time each year traveling to offer concerts, retreats, workshops and parish missions to communities throughout the country. Without missing a beat in the year of COVID, Dan has adapted his in-person retreats to a powerful virtual format.

This unique retreat opportunity is a synthesis of Dan's knowledge of Sacred Scripture, exquisite videography, and beautiful music. You can experience this retreat virtually with Dan in three consecutive one-hour sessions. As a bonus, Dan will join us for a 30-minute “meet and greet” on our final session.

There is no doubt that Dan's ministry has had an enormous impact on the spiritual journey of millions of people. You won't want to miss this opportunity to be part of this virtual experience with Dan Schutte.

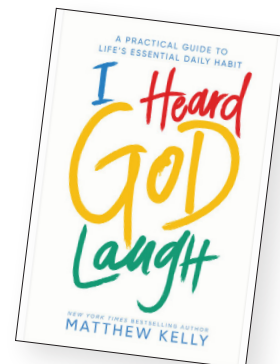

EPIPHANY

The Epiphany of the Lord, also called Theophony or Three Kings Day, is one of the three principal and oldest Feast days of the Church—the others being Christmas and Easter. Although it originated in the Eastern Church, in the West we celebrate Epiphany 12 days after Christmas (which is coincidentally where the song came from). It commemorates the time when the three Wisemen traveled from the East to Bethlehem, to pay homage and bring gifts to the baby Jesus.

Like everything in the Church, symbolism looms large on this feast day. A procession bearing gifts is one way to signify the journey of the Wisemen. And while we have several built-in processions (such as the Gathering, Eucharistic and Recessional), they also remind us of our own faith journey. The image of light also abounds in today's feast day. The Wisemen followed the physical star



which revealed to them where to find the baby Jesus. To us, that star represents the light of Christ to all those who seek God's kingdom.

Finally, we need only to look at today's Responsorial Psalm (Psalm 72), to see beneath the surface of this liturgy – which says, “every nation on earth will adore you,” and especially the 4th verse, “For he shall rescue the poor when he cries out, and the afflicted when he has no one to help him. He shall have pity for the lowly and the poor; the lives of the poor he shall save.”

Thus, just as the Magi sought Jesus and recognized him as a King greater than they have ever known, may we also seek Jesus and find him in the poor, the sick, the vulnerable and the lonely in our world. It is only then that we will truly be able to understand the meaning of this feast day we call Epiphany.

POPE FRANCIS PROCLAIMS “YEAR OF ST JOSEPH”

In a new Apostolic Letter entitled *Patris Corde* (“With a Father’s Heart”), Pope Francis describes St. Joseph as a beloved father, a tender and loving father, an obedient father, an accepting father; a father who is creatively courageous, a working father, a father in the shadows.

The Letter marks the 150th anniversary of Blessed Pope Pius IX’s declaration of St. Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church. To celebrate the anniversary, Pope Francis has proclaimed a special “Year of St. Joseph,” beginning on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception 2020 and extending to the same feast in 2021.

The year 2020 did not turn out the way anyone could have predicted or wished. And one of the effects of COVID and its related restrictions was the cancellation of many events and service works we do as a community. But that did not stop The Madeleine Community! Below are a few of the more recent service works we did...there were

many more throughout the entire community. Unfortunately, your intrepid editor did not get all the photos collected. So, please enjoy these photos and know that at The Madeleine, we stand ready to help our community, our world, and people in need. Thank you, and here's to an amazing 2021!



Knights of Columbus and School Families collect food and socks for St. Vincent de Paul and other organizations

Every two weeks, Madeleine School students and families come to campus and pick up materials from their teachers. But that's not all they do...they bring food for St. Vincent de Paul! This year, our students and families dropped off more than 826 lbs. of food for St. Vincent de Paul, to augment The Madeleine-wide effort. This resulted in 1,800 lbs of food, gift cards, and money for rent and utility assistance for 32 families, (96 people), plus gifts for 39 children. In addition, on a wet and cold November day, The Madeleine Knights of Columbus stood their post as parishioners and families donated almost 600 pairs of socks for St. André Bessette and Transition Projects, and nearly \$2,000 for St. Vincent de Paul to help with the aforementioned food assistance.



Care for Creation

Our Care for Creation ministry was especially active this year, working hard to build awareness of the needs of our planet with the Season of Creation in September celebration and a powerful Care for Creation Stations of the Cross during Lent...our last official communal gathering event before COVID social distancing restrictions took hold.

The Madeleine Auction went virtual

On November 8 was held the 34th Madeleine Auction...and the very first Madeleine Virtual Auction! Hundreds of hours of preparation went into planning, procuring and producing an hour-long livestream event that was amazing beyond all expectations.

Even with fewer things to bid on and buy, the 2020 Madeleine Auction met all of its fundraising goals and produced a record Paddle Raise...all of which went to the school's general budget to help keep Catholic education affordable.



The Madeleine Giving Tree

A Madeleine record of more than 175 gift tags were hung on our Christmas Tree in the Parish Hall turnaround...and almost as fast as they went up they were grabbed by members of our community. Then the gifts came in, overwhelming the Parish Office and taking up a large chunk of the back of the church.

The Feast of the Epiphany

“THE GRACE OF GOD HAS APPEARED, BRINGING SALVATION TO ALL.” —TITUS 2:12-13

As the first 11 chapters of the Book of Genesis remind us, God’s plan for salvation and right relationships began much earlier and extended much wider than the Jewish covenant. It included all peoples or nations (Latin: *gentes*, thus Gentiles). The Feast of the Epiphany (from the Latin, *epiphania*, or Greek, *epiphaneia*, meaning “manifestation” or “appearance.”) celebrates God’s universal salvation in Christ as it was first manifested to non-Jews as described in Matthew’s Gospel account of the Magi (2:1-12).

The story of the Magi (Greek: *magoi*, meaning learned scholars or wise persons, possibly Zoroastrian astrologers from Persia), which only appears in Matthew’s Gospel, reads like his Gospel in miniature because its themes echo the rest of the Gospel. Jesus comes into the world—and also into each person’s life—which demands a decision about how to respond to his presence and his invitation to a new relationship. Some will reject him, as do the Jewish leaders and King Herod, and some will accept him, as do Joseph and Mary and these wise foreigners

who followed a new star-sign to find the new king who would be worshiped by all people.

Matthew describes how the Magi discovered a bright new star rising in the Eastern skies. At that time it was believed that what happened in the heavens with the stars and planets influenced what would happen on earth. So they interpreted this new star as a sign that a great new king was to be born. To discover the identity of this new king, they followed the star to an obscure village in the Roman province of Judea where they found a child to whom they gave their royal gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

For the first time, Gentiles honor the Jew who was God’s promised messiah and savior, who in turn offers them the gift of salvation. The Epiphany reminds us that God is still mysteriously at work, drawing all humanity into a greater realization of the divine presence and plan to reorder our world as God intended it to be through Jesus’ presence with us.



LEARNING FROM THE MAGI

The Magi's star is not just a source of wonder and illumination but it is also the guide for their journey. A journey is a good way to discover a new meaning for ourselves. As we move outwardly toward our goal, we are changed inwardly by the trip. The Magi follow their star and finally find the child in the lowliest of surroundings.

It requires "eyes of faith" to affirm that this vulnerable child in ragged swaddling clothes is really the anticipated great king whose birth will change the course of the ages. But trusting their belief and the clues from the Jewish scriptures, they are willing to acknowledge his royal status and pay him homage. Their commitment is expressed in their gifts. Having found and identified God present in their lives, they offer gifts that stand for themselves. They offer the treasures of their realms—gold, frankincense and myrrh—as signs not only of their reverence for the greatness of the royal child but also of their willingness to worship and serve him.

Once their gifts have been given, the Magi return to their land and their previous lives. But their discovery of the star and the journey it led them on would certainly change them. We too will be changed by our desire to discover the divine in our midst. Like the Magi, once we have experienced God's surprising presence in us and around us in the events of our lives, life can never be the same again. We will see the same old things, but in a brand new way. When we wonder, when we illuminate our lives by using scripture, and when we dare to follow our star to find God in our midst, we certainly will be changed forever.

WHERE IS YOUR STAR?

An Epiphany Household Activity

What was true for the Magi remains true for us today as we continue to search for God and for meaning in our lives. In the darkness of our lives, we look for a star to help us discover God's presence through scripture and the sacraments, through nature, through significant experiences that draw us into the mystery of birth and death, and especially through other persons.

The Magi believed that the new star in the heavens was announcing the birth of a new "super king." So they dared to follow their star to discover his identity. But following a star is a precarious undertaking, not only because the journey is long and leads to the unknown, but also because often our friends and family do not interpret the star the same way we do.

Like these Magi, someone or something has been the star that sparked your interest in Jesus, that drew you either rapidly or reluctantly to him, and that involved you in a life and death story that demands all of your gifts and your full dedication to follow and serve him.

Gather your household around the table and invite each member to share their own answers to the following questions:

- In the midst of your everyday activities, what is or has been the bright "star" that has drawn your attention, that caught your eye, that caused you to stop for a moment to wonder about God's presence in yourself and in creation? Is or was it:
 - something in your situation at home or at work?
 - an accident or a diagnosis of a serious illness?
 - the face of a beloved? The antics of a child?
 - the breathtaking beauty of a sunset? or music? or the beauty of the world?
- Where do you think you are now being led by your star?


