SEASON OF CREATION— TURNING TOWARD OUR CONSCIENCE

A series: Part 4 of 4

In Parts 1-3, we examined three important turnings toward: (1) God, (2) others, and (3) the beauty and mystery of the earth. In this segment, we explore the final turning, an examination of our conscience. The purpose of this final turning is not to instill guilt, but to inspire action. Inspiration can come from our honest answers to these questions:

- Am I a shopaholic, freely spending on unnecessary things?
- ▶ Do I understand that purchasing is not purely an economic act but a moral one?
- ▶ Do I waste food?
- ▶ Do I use water excessively and unconsciously?
- ▶ Do I strive to live simply or am I simply living?
- ▶ How does my wastefulness affect others from accessing basic resources for sustaining a dignified life?
- Am I willing to get involved and speak out to change systems promoting greed and environmental degradation? (Creation at the Crossroads, P. 90)

Our responses to these questions are foundational for unity in mind and heart and the formation of a "new creation." Despite the incredible natural beauty surrounding us, we are painfully aware that the earth is crying out for significant transformation and healing. Currently, our stewardship of God's creation is selfish and self-centered, and devoid of compassion and concern for all living things. We must start with seemingly small changes, and build momentum to conquer the bigger,

transformative changes needed to save our Common Home. St. Francis of Assisi is a powerful role model for how we become effective leaders in respecting and protecting God's creation. His daily meditations on the mysteries of Incarnation and Redemption show us the way:

On the cross, Christ has sanctified creation, made it a sacrament of divine glory and the place of his presence. Christ has become our neighbor and has established a personal, loving and gratuitous relationship with every creature. ... Everything has been re-created as a welcoming space for the free and affectionate encounter (Martin Carbajo Nunez, OFM, Sister Mother Earth: Franciscan Roots of the Laudato Si', p. 87).

Likewise, Pope Francis speaks of an integral ecology, meaning with gratitude we unceasingly recognize and acknowledge everything as a gift. "The environment is God's gift to everyone, and in our use of it we have a responsibility towards the poor, towards future generations and towards humanity as a whole" (Nunez, p. 180).

As we turn toward our conscience, we are called to "contemplate, in wonder, the mystery of the world and to administer responsibly what God has entrusted to us" (Nunez, p. 159). As you examine your conscience, what action will you take to protect and preserve the gift of creation?

OLD CHURCH PROJECT HONORED WITH HISTORIC PRESERVATION AWARD

The Old Church at The Madeleine has been selected as a recipient of the 2021 DeMuro Award for Excellence in Historic Preservation, Reuse and Revitalization by Restore Oregon. This award is the state's highest honor for the

preservation, reuse, and revitalization of architectural and cultural sites.

This project was a huge effort by the entre Madeleine Community, bringing forward more than 550 donors and supporters to resurrect

the original 1911 church on our campus, which had fallen into disrepair since our current main church was built in 1955, and had been unsafe to inhabit.

A 3-year \$3.9 million capital campaign anchored by a \$1 million challenge grant from the Hedinger Family Foundation provided the funding for the restoration.

Construction was completed in summer of 2019, transforming the formerly dilapidated Old Church into a thoughtfully restored sacred space for prayer, learning, performing, and

community use.


The project was submitted for consideration by Carleton Hart Architecture, who provided architectural and construction management for the project.

Restore Oregon exists to educate, advocate, and celebrate our region's historic spaces and places. Their mission is to preserve, reuse, and pass forward the spaces and places that reflect Oregon's diverse cultural heritage and make our communities vibrant, inclusive, and sustainable.







National Migration Week

September 20-26, 2021

For nearly a half century, the Catholic Church in the United States has celebrated National Migration Week, which is an opportunity for the Church to reflect on the circumstances confronting migrants, including immigrants, refugees, children, and victims and survivors of human trafficking.

National Migration Week for 2021 takes place September 20-26, and will climax with the Vatican's celebration of the World Day of Migrants and Refugees (WDMR), which always falls on the last Sunday of September. The primary theme for this year' WDMR is "Towards an ever wider 'we'". In his letter announcing this year's theme, Pope Francis emphasizes that "this focus calls on us to ensure that 'after all this, we will think no longer in terms of 'them' and 'those,' but only 'us" (Fratelli tutti, no. 35). And this universal us must become a reality first of all within the Church which is called to cultivate communion in diversity."

In solidarity with the Vatican, National Migration Week will use the same theme as WDMR – "Towards an ever wider we' – but will emphasize the particular ways in which this theme and its application to the migration question is important for the Catholic Church in the United States. Please be sure to visit the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Justice for Immigrant's webpage in advance of the celebration to access resources that will be developed for this event (https://tinyurl.com/NationalMigrationWeek2021).

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
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
