CHANGES TO RECYCLING PROGRAM

What is going away:

Our partner, Terracycle, has announced it will discontinue the RB Health and Nutrition Recycling Program. We have been collecting and recycling all health and nutrition packaging under this program, so we will no longer be able to recycle these items.



What is being added:

In its negotiations with manufacturers, Terracycle is adding new categories to its recycling program. In partnership with Calphalon, we are adding the opportunity for you to recycle all brands of metal-based cookware, bakeware, and cutlery. This includes non-stick aluminum, stainless steel, carbon steel, and cast iron. Look for the collection box at our recycling center. For safety reasons, if you have cutlery for

recycling, please bring to the Rectory during business hours.

A reminder—We cannot accept the following:

▶ Containers other than #6 clear plastic. No #1 PETE plastic (commonly used for packaging fruit and vegetables). Ridwell will take them for a small charge. More information, www.ridwell.com

▶ Items with partial or full contents. The recycling programs are for the recycling of the packaging, not contents.

If we encounter any non-recyclables, they will be discarded in the garbage. Please help us by only bringing items contained in our flyer or on signage with the collection boxes.

TO SERVE AND BE SERVED

In Mark's gospel this week Jesus says "whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant; whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all." When I hear these words, I am reminded of an experience I witnessed on one pilgrimage to the holy site of Medjugorje, Bosnia-Hercegovina with my mother and her group.



Music Notes

A central component of each pilgrimage is to climb "Cross Mountain" ("Krisevac" in Croatian). Krisevac is aptly named for a 28-ft. concrete cross that sits at its peak. Erected in 1933, the cross commemorates the 1900th Anniversary of Jesus' Passion and death on the Cross—and contains a relic of the True Cross of Jesus.

You might say that climbing Krisevac is a penitential rite of passage for pilgrims in Medjugorje, and veteran pilgrims seem obligated to determine just the right circumstances for a successful climb. If it is hot and crowded, always climb before 8 am; if it is cold, layer up and climb mid-afternoon; don't attempt to climb in the rain—the clay soil is treacherous (especially on the way down); and never, ever climb behind a group of Italians unless you plan to spend the day (they tend to stop, pray, sing all verses and spread out across the entire mountain!)

On a good day, the climb takes anywhere from 45 minutes to almost two hours. The main attraction is praying the Stations of the Cross up the mountain—marked by 15 bronze reliefs along the way. Though not for the faint-hearted, it is common to see both young and old (my mom climbed unassisted well into her 80s), the infirmed carried on stretchers or chairs, and even "locals" who climb barefoot (although I wouldn't recommend the latter). At first glance, the climb doesn't appear to be worth the hype. The first three stations are fairly flat, with a well-worn path and few, if any, large obstacles to overcome. However, after that

the climb becomes steeper and more treacherous—giving pilgrims a glimpse of what Jesus must have endured on his way to the cross. By the 12th station, the terrain becomes almost impossible—with large boulders and a narrow pathway—aptly symbolizing the death of Jesus on the cross. The sacrifice is, of course, worth the effort when one finally reaches the cross!

Over the years, I have witnessed numerous physical and spiritual healings on that mountain—each one making a lasting impression on my heart. This one involved Michael and a pilgrim named Boren. At the time, Michael was suffering from plantar fasciitis and climbing Krisevac was literally the last thing he wanted to do! Originally from India, Boren was well-traveled, well-read (he quoted Shakespeare with ease) and deeply spiritual—an exceptionally confident, proud man. Against our advice, Boren insisted on climbing with a heavy, professional grade camera and a backpack filled with photographic equipment. At the top, noticeably winded, it was apparent he would need help on the climb down. Without thinking, Michael took Boren's backpack, camera and jacket and practically carried him and his wife together down the mountain. At the bottom Michael discovered he was pain free, while Boren was exhausted. Later, at our group meeting, Boren shared that on that mountain he finally understood what it meant to serve and be served. And then, in true Boren fashion, he eloquently sang "The Servant Song"—Will you let me be your servant, let me be as Christ to you; Pray that I may have the grace to let you be my servant, too. It is no wonder that every time I hear that song, I think of Boren and Michael—as both servant and one who served—and how they lived the Gospel of Mark on that day.

RECYCLING PROGRAMS EXPANDED AT THE MADELEINE

Marked collection bins in the breezeway facing 23rd Ave.

The Madeleine's Laudato Si' Circle and Care for Creation Ministry have joined with U. S. based recycler, Terracycle, to offer our parish, school, and community opportunities to responsibly recycle specific items (primarily plastics) not generally handled at curbside. Terracycle has added more manufacturers to its program, and in turn, we have expanded our recycling offerings. Here is a current listing of what we are collecting. Please keep this in mind:

- ▶ Do not include garbage or items not specifically mentioned in the descriptions.
- ▶ Empty containers of contents. No need to wash first; * ensure packaging is dry.



STYROFOAM AND POLYSTYRENE

We have identified a local recycler of Styrofoam and Polystyrene (anything marked #6 like block packaging, meat trays, and to-go containers).

*Please thoroughly wash and dry food containers



METAL-BASED COOKWARE AND CUTLERY

All brands of metal-based cookware, bakeware and cutlery (non-stick Aluminum, Stainless Steel, Carbon Steel, Cast Iron). Please make sure items are thoroughly clean and dry.

LATE JULY® SNACKS

All Late July® snack packaging as seen in these examples. Limited to Late July brand only.

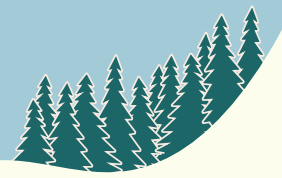

ST. LUKE THE EVANGELIST

October 18

Early historians said this author of the third Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles was born to a pagan family in Antioch (Turkey) and converted to Christianity. According to Paul's letters and Acts, he was a doctor and Paul's companion during his later journeys and imprisonment in Rome. Luke's New Testament writings in Greek were for gentiles, extending to them the salvation promised to Israel. He is the patron of physicians and surgeons and, because of a legend that he painted a Marian icon, of painters.
