A SYNOD ON SYNODALITY

ALL HALLOWS EVE—AND MORE!

Music Notes

The tradition of Halloween, it seems, has blossomed into one of our most

popular secular celebrations in the country. Perhaps it is a sign of the times, but it is estimated that \$6 billion annually is spent on Halloween, making it the country's second largest commercial holiday after Christmas!



American tradition, Halloween's origins date back to the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain. This day marked the end of summer and the beginning of the dark, cold winter—a time of year most often associated with human death. The Celts believed that on this night, the boundary between the world of the living and the dead was blurred and ghosts would return to earth. Commemorated with bonfires and costumes to ward off ghosts, this event was known as All Hallows Eve, and later, Halloween.

In the 8th century, Pope Boniface IV dedicated the Roman Pantheon to honor all Christian martyrs, and the Feast of All Martyrs Day was established in the Western church. Pope Gregory III expanded the feast to include all saints as well as martyrs and moved the feast to November 1. By the 9th century, the influence of Christianity had spread, where it gradually blended with and replaced older Celtic rites. In 1000 A.D., the church officially made November 2 All Souls' Day, a day to honor all the dead.

In today's Western Church, All Saints' Day (also called "All Hallows" or "Hallowmas"), is the sacred version of Halloween. It is a day set aside specifically to honor those known martyrs and saints recognized by the Church, and thus usually a Holy Day of Obligation for its importance. I mean, without those "heroes and defenders of faith", where would we be? In historically Catholic countries, All Saints is a national holiday. Across much of Western and Eastern Europe, the day is commemorated with offerings of flowers or candles lit on the graves.

On the heels of All Saints' Day, we celebrate All Souls' Day—a time for us to pray, not just for our official "canonized" saints, but for ALL who have died—including our loved ones. I have

said before that the Communion of Saints—all of them—is one of the aspects

I like best about being Catholic. We choose a Saint's name at our Confirmation,

look to the Saints to help us find lost articles, sell our homes, heal our bodies and souls, and during every Mass, we always pray for those that have gone before us. I take solace in the fact that I am

still connected to my dad and other family, and now my sister—in death, as in life.

While the Church does not consider All Souls' Day a holy day of obligation, traditionally parishes will honor those that have died with a Requiem Mass or other liturgical service. At The Madeleine we do just that, offering a Service of Light on All Souls' Day. The music itself is taken from various Requiem Masses (or Mass for the Dead). This year, the opening Introit is taken from the Requiem of John Rutter, first performed in 1985. Although in its entirety it has its dark, haunting moments, the beauty of this movement conveys a message of hope and comfort. During the service, votive candles will be lit during the singing of the Litany of the Saints, to include those who have died this year in our parish. At the conclusion, Michael Kissinger's Jazz Requiem combines the ancient Latin chant, "In Paradisum," with an almost lullaby-like paraphrase of the ancient prayer—which was traditionally sung in a procession on the way from the final blessing in the church to the cemetery. At The Madeleine, we also go one step further. The names of all those that have died in our Parish the last 110 years are remembered on banners hung around the church. We are literally surrounded by Saints!

Indeed, more than mere statues in a church building, or names on a banner, as Catholics we believe wholeheartedly that there is a spiritual connection between those in Heaven and on Earth—and that brings us together as one body of Christ. As St. Therese of Lisieux said, "I will spend my heaven doing good on earth."

MASS INTENTIONS DURING NOVEMBER

During the month of November, we especially remember all of those who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith. Mass intentions are a wonderful way of honoring our beloved deceased and for the living who face challenges for which they receive special graces from the offering of the Mass. Envelopes are in the church vestibule or you can request a Mass throughout the year by contacting the Parish Office.

Mass Intentions Explained

Mass intentions refer to the particular purpose for which a specific Mass is offered. A Mass intention means that the sacrifice is being offered for someone living or dead. An individual may ask a priest to offer a Mass for several reasons such as in thanksgiving, for the intentions of another person (i.e. on a birthday), or most commonly, for the repose of a soul of someone who has died. By doing so, the priest applies special graces from God upon that person or intention. The tradition of

offering Masses for others, particularly the dead, originates in the very early Church.

A Mass is the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross, brought forward in time to the present. At the Mass, the Holy Spirit turns the bread and wine into the actual Body and Blood of Christ. This act is not merely a symbolic gesture. Jesus died on the cross while also giving us the gift of the Eucharist for bringing the sacrifice forward in time. A Mass intention, then, allows for inclusion of a particular purpose close to our hearts. When receiving communion, an individual's participation in the Eucharistic sacrifice is complete and their intention becomes open to the fullness of the power of the Eucharist.

When faced with the death of someone close to us (even a person who is not Catholic), offering our prayers and requesting a Mass intention for the repose of their soul are more beneficial and comforting than any sympathy card or bouquet of flowers. At the time of requesting a Mass intention, the requester is asked to make a recommended donation of \$10 (often referred to as a stipend). The donation does not pay for the graces from God (they are of infinite value and cannot be paid for). Rather, a stipend for a Mass intention is meant to cover expenses of providing not just that particular Mass, but the entire infrastructure related to celebrating the Eucharist. Likewise, the person requesting a Mass intention made a sacrificial offering of their own.

Pope Paul VI said, "The Mass is the most perfect form of prayer!" Consequently, Mass intentions are a great treasure of the Church and have a spiritual weight that is incalculable.

Requesting a Mass Intention at The Madeleine

Mass intentions at The Madeleine may be requested through the Parish Office. At the time of requesting a Mass intention, you may select a card for memorializing the requested Mass intention.

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Refresh the Dream. Replace the Turf!

Each year, we hear from parishioners asking how they can assist with the school auction.

The Madeleine Field of Dreams needs a refresh! After 15 years of kids running, kicking, sliding, dodging, and wrestling, the original turf has been completely worn down and is far beyond its intended lifespan. A Brief History of the Field

Back in the 1960s, the entire field was paved in asphalt. Then in the early 2000s a group of devoted Madeleine parents and parishioners had an ambitious, seemingly unattainable dream: replace the cracked, slippery, crumbling, knee-skinning, clothestearing, bruise-inducing asphalt playground and create a multiuse field our community could be proud of.

The entire community gathered together...parents, grandparents, parishioners, alumni and friends. They raised money, they donated professional services, they got grants and foundation donations... and they turned that broken-down asphalt patch into a green, fun, beautiful oasis: the Field of Dreams. Their investment of time, talent and treasure made possible the many activities our kids enjoy on the field today: recess, gym class, CYO practices, Jogathons, school field days, epic kickball tournaments, and so much more.

The Field of Dreams is the backyard of our community, where kids drift in to burn off energy before homework and parents chat along the sidelines. Many teens who graduated from The Madeleine return to the field on weekends just to hang out or for extra practice time.

And now, in a time when our children must be physically distanced from one another, the Field of Dreams is where they get a "brain break" to run and reset so they have the capacity to learn.

Our Team Goal

Whether this is your child's last year at The Madeleine or their first, it is time to come together. Regardless of whether you're paying it forward or investing in your future, here are the stats you need to know so we can reach our goal together:

- * Thanks to steady field rental fees through the years, we're starting with a nest egg of \$60,000.
- The Field of Dreams Replacement Project is estimated to cost \$170,000 (including complete turf replacement and maintenance for the first few years).
- Our goal is to raise at least \$90,000 during the paddle raise, with the remaining balance being raised through generous donations from the larger community.

Fifteen years ago, The Madeleine community dreamt big and built the field that our children and the entire community enjoy today.



Il Hallows' Day, the Solemnity of All Saints, or All Saints' Day is a celebration of all Catholic saints held on November 1 each year. "On this solemnity, we recall the holy men and women who, having completed their earthly journeys, now live forever with God. These saints, though not canonized, offer us models of abiding faith and love of God and neighbor" (Essential Guide to Seasons and Saints, 109).

In the Catholic Church, we are called to imitate and venerate saints because of their heroically virtuous lives, martyrdom, or their offering of life for others. But, what does veneration mean and why do we pray to the saints?

Veneration of the saints fosters our faith in God and does not detract from it. Rather, our faith in God is strengthen by our relationship with our brothers and sisters in the faith who are in heaven. The Church teaches that by imitating the virtues lived by the saints, the saints brings us closer to Christ. When we ask the saints to pray for us, we ask them to join their wills with the will of God and intercede for us here on earth. This is the Communion of Saints which we profess every Sunday in the Creed.







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
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
