The Madeleine Parish is pleased to announce a COVID Vaccine Clinic in partnership with Providence Health on Wednesday, November 10, from 3:00–7:00 pm in The Madeleine Parish Hall.

At the clinic, Providence will offer Pfizer, Moderna, and Johnson & Johnson vaccines, and will be able to provide first and second doses, along with booster doses for those eligible (www.bit.ly/tmp-boost).

They also hope to be able to provide Pfizer vaccines for children 5-11 if they are able to receive inventory in time for the clinic.

No appointment is necessary, but in order for Providence to be prepared, please

complete a brief survey (www.bit.ly/tmp-vaxx) by Monday, November 8. The survey asks which vaccine dose and which vaccine manufacturer you would like to receive. Please complete the survey ONCE for each person in your family who will be attending the clinic.

If you have received any vaccine doses, be sure to bring your original vaccine card to the clinic, so it can be updated with additional notations.

MASS INTENTIONS DURING NOVEMBER

Mass intentions are a wonderful way of honoring our beloved deceased and for the living who face challenges for which they receive special graces from the offering of the Mass.

Mass Intentions Explained

Mass intentions refer to the particular purpose for which a specific Mass is offered. A Mass intention means that the sacrifice is being offered for someone living or dead. An individual may ask a priest to offer a Mass for several reasons such as in thanksgiving, for the intentions of another person (i.e. on a birthday), or most commonly, for the repose of a soul of someone who has died. By doing so, the priest applies special graces from God upon that person or intention. The tradition of offering Masses for others, particularly the dead, originates in the very early Church.

A Mass is the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross, brought forward in time to the present. At the Mass, the Holy Spirit turns the bread and wine into the actual Body and Blood of Christ. This act is not merely a symbolic gesture. Jesus died on the cross while also giving us the gift of the Eucharist for bringing the sacrifice forward in time. A Mass intention, then, allows for inclusion of a particular purpose close to our

hearts. When receiving communion, an individual's participation in the Eucharistic sacrifice is complete and their intention becomes open to the fullness of the power of the Eucharist.

When faced with the death of someone close to us (even a person who is not Catholic), offering our prayers and requesting a Mass intention for the repose of their soul are more beneficial and comforting than any sympathy card or bouquet of flowers. At the time of requesting a Mass intention, the requester is asked to make a recommended donation of \$10 (often referred to as a stipend). The donation does not pay for the graces from God (they are of infinite value and cannot be paid for). Rather, a stipend for a Mass intention is meant to cover expenses of providing not just that particular Mass, but the entire infrastructure related to celebrating the Eucharist. Likewise, the person requesting a Mass intention made a sacrificial offering of their own.

Requesting a Mass Intention

Mass intentions at The Madeleine may be requested through the Parish Office. At the time of requesting a Mass intention, you may select a card for memorializing the requested Mass intention.





PRAYER & THE ART OF IMPROVISATION

Music Notes

In our home, we have a painting of the great jazz trumpeter, Miles Davis. Etched

in the painting is one of his most famous quotes, "Don't play what's there—play what's not there!" This quote sums up the forward-thinking Davis, whose musical innovations, in spite of his personal struggles, arguably changed the course of jazz music for almost 50 years. Looking



To the untrained ear, some people perceive jazz to be just a random collection of notes played by the soloist. Don't get me wrong. While there are some who do play that way, a good jazz musician plays within a framework of well-thought out jazz chord progressions—creating a musical picture as they improvise. Think of the standard 12-bar blues chord progression. Master this in every key and you are well on your way to understanding jazz improvisation.

Although jazz is a distinctly American genre, improvisation can be found throughout the history of Western music. Cantors in the early Church developed highly complex improvised chants based upon a framework of acceptable musical intervals (ie: never more than an interval of a fourth). When more voices were added, this melodic practice eventually led to polyphony (two or more independent lines sung simultaneously). Polyphonic music was firmly grounded in a cantus firmus (fixed chant) as the basis for its melody, although it retained an improvisatory flavor—a type of Renaissance vocal jazz. Later, composers in the Baroque period experimented with a figured bass—a kind of musical shorthand

for keyboards—where a bass line was written out with accompanying num-

bers (representing musical intervals) written below the note. Similar to today's pop lead sheets, this kind of notation allowed for improvisation by the performer and paved the way to structured, yet virtuosic personal expression.

If you think about it (and I have), it is not just

music that reflects the art of improvisation—it is also prayer. In this week's gospel, Jesus warns to beware of the scribes who, "as a pretext, recite lengthy prayers," in a vain attempt to demonstrate their spiritual superiority and false generosity. In the end, their hyperbole resembles more a random collection of notes rather than substantive prayer.

So just as in Mark's gospel Jesus illustrates to the disciples how NOT to pray, we also look to scripture for instructions on HOW to pray. Saint Pope John Paul II recognized, "We have to learn to pray: as if we were learning this art ever anew from the lips of the Divine Master himself, like the first disciples: 'Lord, teach us to pray!" (Lk 11:1), The prayer that Jesus taught was, of course, the Our Father. Much the same as a 12-bar blues or a figured bass, the Our Father (a prayer of adoration, repentance, thanksgiving, and intercession) can provide the spiritual framework for creating your own improvisatory prayer. And while there is no wrong way to pray (unless you behave like the aforementioned scribes in Mark's gospel), consider adding some meaningful improvisation to your prayers this week. In other words..."Don't pray what is there—but pray what is not there."

And now, in a time when our children must be physically distanced from one another, the Field of Dreams is where they get a "brain break" to run and reset so they have the capacity to learn.

Our Team Goal




