A CHRISTMAS REFLECTION

In today's gospel, (*December 21*, *Luke 1:39-45*, *56*) Luke opens the door to the home of Zachariah and Elizabeth. He invites us in to witness one of the happiest moments in scripture. We see a young, rosy-cheeked girl, bursting through the door, dropping her travel bag on the floor, and running into the arms of her gray-haired, pregnant cousin. What a wonderful three months they must have spent together...praising God, as they prepared for the births of their baby boys and sharing the special bond that women down through the ages have shared.

When I was growing up, my mother and her two sisters would meet every Monday morning at the home of my Aunt Agnes. They would gather around the table in her breakfast nook, drink coffee, enjoy fresh pastries from the local bakery and share the good and bad happenings in their lives. (This was one of those times of "visitation" that Fr. Mike referred to in his homily on Dec. 19th.) The summer I celebrated my twelfth birthday, I was invited to join them. For me it was a "rite of passage." They no longer saw me as a little girl, but now I was a young woman approaching adulthood. I valued being a part of those Monday mornings with my mother and her two sisters. Even after I grew up and left home, if I was in town on a Monday morning, I would join them in the breakfast nook for coffee, fresh pastries and conversation.

Perhaps it was my memory of those "visitations" with my mother and her sisters that stir my imagination and make me wonder what it was like in the home of Zachariah and Elizabeth during those three months when Mary was their guest.

I visualize the two women sitting together

at the breakfast table. Mary is sipping a special herbal tea to calm her morning sickness. Elizabeth is complaining about a sleepless night spent tossing and turning as she tried to find a comfortable position that would satisfy baby John, so he would calm down and quit moving around in her womb.

Did the two women prepare for their babies by singing the lullabies from their childhood as they sat at the loom weaving soft blankets for their soon to be born infants? As they sewed pieces of fabric together making tiny gowns and robes, did they imagine what their little boys would look like? Did Mary wonder if Jesus would have her eyes, or her smile, or the dimple in her chin? Would his hair be the color and texture of hers? What personality traits and habits would he inherit after spending nine months growing inside of her human body?

I imagine the two pregnant women going for long afternoon walks through the hill country, breathing the fresh air and praising God for his presence in their lives and the gift of his creation.

This season of Christmas, I encourage you to take Mary, this brave young girl, down from her pedestal and embrace her as Elizabeth did. Celebrate her humanity, for without her humanity, God's plan would not have worked. Acknowledge the discomfort she must have felt riding that donkey to Bethlehem and then the overwhelming joy of finally giving birth.

God, we offer you our earthly humanity this Christmas. We await your divine visitation in our lives. Come make your home within each of us.

The Madeleine School in Service

Our Madeleine School students were busy in service this year. There are so many great causes represented, but some include placemats created for **Meals on Wheels**, Santa's Sock Drive for **Blanchet House** (more than 570 pairs collected), Legos and Grady's Toy Drive for **Randall Children's Hospital** (13,000 pieces collected), Halloween Free Dress Day donations for **Oregon Humane Society** (\$575 raised), extra Halloween candy collected for **Ronald McDonald House** (5 huge bins!). So many more, but this was just a sampling that we had photos for.

Of special note was the creation of the CLEAN Club. Students in this Catholic Leadership Environmental Action Network club meet weekly to discuss things we can all do to protect our climate and environment. In addition to their weekly meetings, members of the club participated in a Community Cleanup Event in November.










The Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph

Let us never forget to thank you each day for all that sustains us and to look to Christ, who comes to us in the events of family life, in the sacraments of the Church, and in service to the poor.



CHRISTMAS CAROLS IN A MAJOR KEY

Music Motes

I must admit, I love Christmas—and Christmas carols! Each year Michael and I, and our good friend Mary, pile in our 1992 Ford Ranger (every year I

pray it still runs), crank up the Christmas tunes on K103 and belt out "Feliz Navidad" on the way to cut down our Christmas trees at (I kid you not) the Tree Wisemen Christmas Tree farm. When decorating, our "go to" Christmas CD is Barry Mannilow (although many of his

Christmas tunes bear a striking resemblance to "I Write the Songs"), and Mannheim Steamroller. Once in a while, we throw a little Elvis, John Denver, and even The Temptations in the mix!

But inasmuch as I love the sounds and sights of Christmas, it is a season that is also tinged with melancholy - a time that we wistfully remember Christmases past, mourn those that we have lost, and ponder what lies ahead. That dichotomy of joy and sorrow is also reflected in Christmas carols. Take, for instance, the French carol "Angels We Have Heard on High." First published in 1855, it tells of the angelic announcement of Jesus' birth to the shepherds. Scholars think that these shepherds may have been those who supplied lambs for sacrifice at the temple in Jerusalem. But on this night, the shepherds were called away to greet Jesus. This joyous-sounding carol is also a prophecy of the sacrifice of the true Lamb of God that is to come.

Published in 1864, "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day," the lyrics by American poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, are a direct reflection of the Civil War. In the next to last stanza, Longfellow mourns, "And in despair I bowed my head, there is no peace on earth. For hate is strong and mocks the song of peace on earth, good will to men." But the bells respond, "Then pealed the bells more loud and deep, God is not dead, nor doth he sleep; the wrong shall fail, the right prevail, with peace on

earth, good will to men."

The Epiphany carol "We Three Kings" is, perhaps, the most prophetic. It is not just the story of the three Kings visiting

the baby Jesus—but in the gifts that they bring. Gold was the treasure of Kings; Jesus was born to be King of the Jews. Frankincense was an important part of ancient Israel's worship of God; Jesus is the child of God. And finally, Myrrh, a spice used to embalm the dead, foreshadows

Christ's death to be Savior of the world. Musically, it follows suit—alternating between the minor-sounding verses (written in the Aeolian mode) and the chorus written in a major key.

In 1719, Isaac Watts based the famous, "Joy to the World" on Psalm 98, which tells of the Messiah's coming and kingdom. Perhaps divinely inspired, Watts strayed a bit from the Psalm when he penned the third stanza - "No more let sins and sorrows grow; nor thorns infest the ground." The tune is set by none other than G.F. Handel (of "Messiah" fame). Hint: if you take away the rhythm, it is just a simple major scale sung backwards!

Finally, perhaps the simplest vet most profound of all carols is "Silent Night." The lyrics were written by Josef Mohr, the assistant priest at St. Nicholas Church in Oberndorf, Germany. With an organ in need of repair, Mohr turned to Franz Gruber, a then school teacher to arrange the song to be played on the guitar at Midnight Mass. This unlikely friendship, much like the humble beginnings of the Christ Child, led to the creation of one of the most famous Christmas carols in all of history.

This Christmas I invite you to celebrate both the joys—and embrace the sorrows—of the season, as we rejoice in the birth of Christ as the salvation for all humanity. Merry Christmas!




