Thursdays, March 10 & 17, 7:00 pm • Old Church at The Madeleine



RCIA: Rite of Signing & Sending, Rite of Election

This weekend our RCIA candidates participate in the Rite of Signing and Sending in which we 'send' the Candidates to the Bishop for recognition and the Call to Continuing Conversion. The Rite of Sending provides our parish with the opportunity to express our approval, and rejoice in their decision to prepare to receive the sacraments of initiation. Lenten Fasting & Abstinence

Every year, we get questions about the fasting



requirements for Catholics during Lent. And, sometimes, those discussions can get animated with family histories, special exceptions and imaginative definitions of fasting. So, we thought we'd publish what the Archdiocese sent us. Enjoy (or don't, if it's a Friday!). To quote:

All Catholics 14 years and older must abstain from meat on the Fridays of Lent, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. All Catholics between the ages 18 and 59 are to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

To fast means to eat one full meal; the other two meals that day should be less than the normal amount unless they are already at a minimum for good health. Eating between meals is not permitted; however, liquids including coffee, milk and fruit juices are allowed.

MUSIC NOTES: KEEP WALKING

Our Lenten journey begins this week in the desert with Jesus—fasting and praying for the next 40 days. Luke's gospel reminds us that Jesus resists the temptation of the devil at every turn—bolstered by the Holy Spirit, he remains undeterred, purposeful and steadfast in his journey.

I must admit, Lent has always been a challenge for me. I sometimes find myself wandering aimlessly in a spiritual desert for 40 days. Often, I am tempted to eat meat on Fridays, skip my daily prayers or, worse yet—worry about accidentally bursting forth with an "Alleluia." (To a church musician, singing an "Alleluia" during Lent is close to a mortal sin). The latter, of course, makes perfect sense. Church practice dictates that we fast from this verbal expression of praise and joy during Lent, so that on Easter Sunday, we are filled with even more joy when "Alleluias" abound once again!

That being said, this week's scripture reminds me of the many times where God has walked with me in the midst of trial and temptation. Although seemingly insignificant at the time, one such experience was climbing the 463 steps to the top of the Duomo in Florence, Italy. Now, most people would think of this popular tourist attraction as no big deal—however, given my anxiety of enclosed places, large crowds, and heights, this was to me, a trifecta of fear I never had any desire to experience! But, Michael assured me that the walkway was not too narrow,



we would climb when it wasn't crowded, and the view at the top would make it all worth it. I was NOT convinced—but I trusted him, acquiesced and, rosary in hand, we started walking.

The first 200 steps were okay-not too hot, crowded or narrow-yet. As we climbed higher, the steps became steeper, the walkway narrower, and I began to feel that familiar anxiety. I was tempted to go back down-but kept walking. Just before we reached the catwalk that traverses the inside of the Duomo, I had decided I had had enough-only to realize I was trapped by an Italian guide and a large group of tourists coming up the stairs. I had no choice but to keep walking. Just at that moment another couple made their way through the crowd behind us and the woman said to me, "I feel the same way-I'm terrified, too." Bolstered by a kindred spirit, I again resisted the temptation to descend the stairs, and the four of us climbed those last 100 steps to the top. Michael was right, of course. The city view from the top of the Cupola was more beautiful than I had imagined. And surprisingly, the anxiety I had experienced on that journey all but disappeared. Reaching the top was truly my "Alleluia" moment—a tiny glimpse of heaven on earth! As for that other couple, we never saw them again—but I am convinced that God sent an angel to walk with me on that day.

Music is a great gift from God to aid us in our Lenten-and life-travels. Over the years, I have developed a playlist of what I call "Journey" songs-spirituals with prevalent walking rhythms and texts that call on God to guide us on our way. This week, I find the spiritual, "I Want Jesus to Walk with Me" to be particularly meaningful. This song is characterized by an ostinato line (that is, rhythm and notes that are repeated several times), that I refer to as a musical heartbeat, and a melody that sounds similar to a wail or cry—often heard when singing the blues. The words are simple and powerful—"All along my pilgrim journey, I want Jesus to walk with me."

So, no matter if we are wandering in the desert or climbing the steps of the Duomo, I encourage you to keep walking. The good news is Jesus is and always will be there to accompany us on our journey—leading us to the greatest "Alleluia" moment of all in heaven!

High school baseball creates a connection


While occasional generosity is praiseworthy, a lifetime of giving is rich in meaning. The lives of **Jim and Terry (Theresa) O'Hanlon** demonstrate that it is possible that generosity is most rich when faith is at the center.

Jim's first encounter with Mount Angel Abbey came not from the monastery but from a baseball diamond. Playing second base for his high school, the sincedissolved Columbia Prep in Portland, Jim recalls playing against Mount Angel High School in a makeshift field in front of the Abbey church. Although Mount Angel's landscaping has changed a lot since then, Jim clearly remembers the event with fondness.

After high school, Jim spent 18 months in the Coast

Guard before enrolling at the University of Portland. The university sometimes organized dances for its all-male student body with the all-female Marylhurst College. At one of these dances in 1948, Jim first met his lifelong love and future spouse, Terry. Wed in 1951, Jim and Terry O'Hanlon celebrated 70 years of marriage in 2021.

Jim's best-known legacy of service, Blanchet House in Portland, is just a year younger than his marriage, this year celebrating its 70th anniversary. Modeled after the houses of hospitality of Dorothy Day and the Catholic Worker movement, Jim and the other eight co-founders of Blanchet House originally wanted to establish a fraternity for themselves. However, Fr. Francis Kennard, an alumnus of

coupled with Terry's brother having spent some time in the seminary, have inspired the O'Hanlons to support Mount Angel Seminary financially. As the couple received spiritual nourishment on the Hilltop and befriended Mount Angel seminarians and priests, their generosity deepened into a richly meaningful hallmark of their life together.

SAFETY & SECURITY COMMITTEE, MARCH 9



Uning the Rite of Election, the Church formally announces the names of those who will soon celebrate the Sacraments of Initiation. Usually the Rite of Election takes place at the cathedral with the bishop on the First Sunday of Lent, and those who are named will celebrate Baptism, Confirmation, and First Communion at their parishes during the following Easter Vigil. These individuals enter the cathedral as "catechumens" and leave as "elect." The liturgy may also be called Enrollment of Names.

"Election" refers to the idea of "the chosen people." In Israel's early history,

Rite of Election

God chose a people and established a covenant with them. Christians believe that God continues to choose people, now through the covenant of Baptism. The Rite of Election thus establishes the names of those who will enter the new covenant through the Sacraments of Initiation.

The key moments of the rite are the Affirmation by the Godparents and the Act of Admission or Election. In the affirmation, the godparents testify that the catechumens are worthy to be initiated. Their testimony reveals the church's positive judgment about the catechumens' desire and behavior. The entire assembly may also join the affirmation.

Next, the bishop invites the catechumens to sign the Book of the Elect. In some dioceses, this action has already taken place in parishes during the Rite of Sending, and the books are presented at this point. Finally, during the Act of Admission or Election, the bishop declares that the catechumens are members of the elect, to be initiated at the next Easter Vigil. Although many people refer to the liturgy as the time when catechumens "go to meet the bishop," its meaning is very different. It is not about meeting a celebrity. It is about being named among God's chosen people.

baptized person who wishes to become a Catholic does so through the Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. Many parishes celebrate this liturgy as part of the Easter Vigil, but it may take place any time of year.

Baptized candidates are often put in formation together with unbaptized catechumens. But their situation is quite different. As baptized members of the Body of Christ, they need the specific formation that prepares them to be received into the Catholic Church, whereas unbaptized catechumens need a broader formation to become a follower of Jesus

Christ. Of course, some catechumens have already had more Christian formation than some candidates have, so the preparation is best personalized for each individual.

When those responsible for their formation and the candidates agree that they are ready, the Rite of Reception is celebrated. It may take place at any Sunday Mass of year.

After the homily, everyone recites the Creed together. Then the one to be received says:

I believe and profess all that the holy Catholic Church believes, teaches, and proclaims to be revealed by God (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, 491).

The priest then recites the Act of Reception, which receives the person into the Catholic Church.

Immediately, the priest confirms the new Catholic. A bishop does not need to do so on this occasion. The priest offers some sign of welcome— a handshake or embrace, for example. After the Universal Prayer, the entire community may extend to the new member a sign of peace.

Then the one who has been received participates in Communion for the first time with the Catholic faithful.
