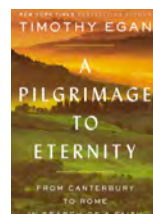

LENTEN FASTING & ABSTINENCE

Every year, we get questions about the fasting requirements for Catholics during Lent. Here they are:

All Catholics 14 years and older must abstain from meat on the Fridays of Lent, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. All Catholics between the ages 18 and 59 are to fast on Ash Wednesday and

Good Friday.

To fast means to eat one full meal; the other two meals that day should be less than the normal amount unless they are already at a minimum for good health. Eating between meals is not permitted; however, liquids including coffee, milk and fruit juices are allowed.

MUSIC NOTES: THE HEALING BALM OF GILEAD

The Tale of Two Saints

This past week, sandwiched in between the second and third Sundays of Lent, the Church honored the lives of two great Saints—St. Patrick (March 17) and St. Joseph (March 19).

St. Patrick's Day is almost universally celebrated. Even if one is not Irish, it is fun to wear green, dance an Irish jig or two, and perhaps drink a green beer (unless you gave it up for Lent). As the Patron Saint of Ireland, St. Patrick was actually born in 5th century Britain. However, St. Patrick had a good grasp of the everyday ritual signs and customs of the Irish people—and used these to single-handedly convert a large part of Ireland to Christianity. Some say the Celtic Cross (a combination of both sun and cross), as well as the Shamrock (whose three leaves illustrate the Trinity), originated with St. Patrick. A man of the people, it is no wonder that St. Patrick became a saint by popular vote (which was how saints were selected at that time).

By and large, the Irish are fiercely proud of their culture and faith—in fact, they are intertwined. Irish music, of course, reflects the character of its people—melodious and tuneful, it is always infused with just a tinge of melancholy. Perhaps that is why Irish music has made its way into our worship. Such well-known hymns as “Be Thou My Vision,” “Canticle of the Turning” (heard in Irish pubs as “Star of the County Down”) and “The King of Love My Shepherd Is (from the famous tune, “Columba”) evolved from Irish folk tunes. And the most



beloved Irish song of all time, “Danny Boy,” is also the basis for the hymn, “He Looked Beyond My Fault.” Gospel singer Dottie Rambo wrote the text in memory of her brother, who reportedly gave his heart to God after battling life-long drug addiction. I would bet that this famous tune can be named anywhere in the world in just four notes!

Often overshadowed by St. Patrick's Day, the Church celebrates the Feast of St. Joseph on March 19. As the husband of Mary and earthly father of Jesus, St. Joseph is considered, among other titles, the Patron Saint of the Universal Church—which is a big deal—and accordingly, the Feast was elevated to a rank of Solemnity. To mark the 150th anniversary of this title, Pope Francis issued an apostolic letter titled, “Patris Corde” (With a Father's Heart), and proclaimed a special Year of St. Joseph in 2021—comparing the importance of ordinary people quietly doing extraordinary things to that of St. Joseph. Although highly important, little is known about St. Joseph. Scripture

refers to him as a “just man” and Saint Pope John Paul II once said, “St. Joseph is a man of great spirit. He is great in faith, not because he speaks his own words, but above all because he listens to the words of the Living God.” It should be no surprise then, that St. Joseph is also known as the patron saint of social justice, immigrants and even home sellers (am not sure how that one came about, although many bury statues of St. Joseph upside down when selling their houses).

Not to be outdone by the Irish, the Italians regard St. Joseph as the Patron Saint of Sicily. According to legend, during the Middle Ages the Sicilians prayed to St. Joseph when they were experiencing a great drought. When God sent St. Joseph to grant them rain and the drought ended, the Sicilians vowed to honor him each year on March 19. Instead of green, the Italians wear red. At the heart of every home—and every parade—is a huge elaborate altar, divided into three to represent the Trinity and bearing an abundance of Italian food and relics. And no celebration would be complete without dancing the “Tarantella.” In Italy, March 19 is also recognized as Father's Day.

Whether we wear green or dance the “Tarantella,” let us always remember that these celebrations are the outward signs and symbols born in the hearts of a grateful people. And these Saints truly represent the grace and mercy of God in our everyday lives.

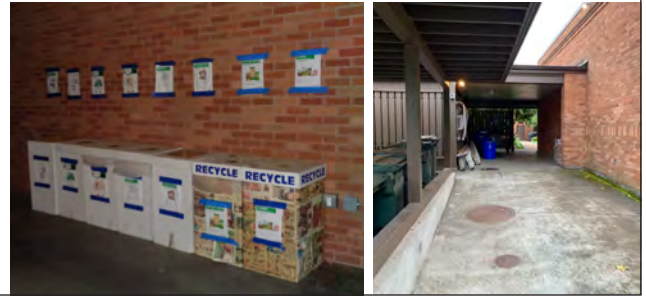

RECYCLING PROGRAMS AT THE MADELEINE

The Madeleine's Laudato Si' Circle and Care for Creation Ministry have joined with U. S. based recycler, Terracycle, to offer our parish, school, and community opportunities to responsibly recycle specific items (primarily plastics) not generally handled at curbside. Terracycle has added more manufacturers to its program, and in turn, we have expanded our recycling offerings. Here is a current listing of what we are collecting. Please keep this in mind:

- ▶ Do not include garbage or items not specifically mentioned in the descriptions.
- ▶ Empty containers of contents. No need to wash first; ensure packaging is dry.



DISCONTINUED: STYROFOAM/ POLYSTYRENE

Regrettably, we can no longer accept Styrofoam and Polystyrene materials. Although endorsed by Metro, we have recently learned (through an independent report) of major violations by the local recycler in the responsible handling and recycling of these materials.

In Memoriam

THE MADELEINE FAMILY REMEMBERS

GERALD TENNEY

A Funeral Mass was held for Gerald Tenney on Friday, March 18 at The Madeleine.

Gerald Andrew Tenney was born on September 12th, 1939, in Amsterdam, NY, to Nelson Howard Tenney and Lillian Frances Kryzak. Jerry was an only child. He participated in basketball, baseball, and track while in school. His father, Nelson, served in the Navy as a diver during WWII. Nelson died several years after the war. Jerry attended Broadalbin High School, and then enlisted in the US Army as an MP. He was later stationed in Germany, before being moved back to NY. He married his wife, Jo, in 1962. They had three children, Beth Bianca, David Tenney, and Laura Tenney.

Jerry and Jo moved to Vancouver, WA, where he continued working as recruiter for the Army in the Portland area. He retired in 1979 after twenty-three years of service and at the rank of SGM. After retiring, he attended college and graduated from Portland State University with a B.S. in Finance, received his teaching certificate, and later a real estate license.

He had four grandchildren, Shanley, Danny, Mike, and Chris. He also gained what would have been a future granddaughter-in-law, Mollie. He cherished his grandchildren and sadly will miss Danny and Mollie's wedding. He loved to fish on the Lewis River, visit Hawaii, and see family in upstate NY. During his life, he built a camp in the Adirondack Mountains, two homes

in SW Washington, ran a marathon, climbed Mt. St. Helens and Mt. Adams, and rode his bike with his wife whenever possible. These bike trips included 100-mile races, the Oregon coast, the Adirondack Mountains, Provence, France, and the senior Olympics in Utah.

After his retirement, Gerald was diagnosed with Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma. He completed chemotherapy, and his cancer went into remission for 23 years. Unfortunately, his cancer returned in 2013. During the last ten years of his life, he underwent several treatments to overcome his disease. Despite being in remission in January 2022, he contracted COVID and was admitted to PeaceHealth Hospital. Jerry passed away at 5:30 AM on January 29th, 2022, in Vancouver, WA.

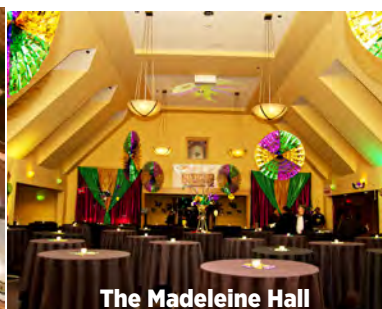
