#### LENTEN FASTING & ABSTINENCE

Per the Archdiocese:

All Catholics 14 years and older must abstain from meat on the Fridays of Lent, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. All Catholics between the ages 18 and 59 are to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

To fast means to eat one full meal; the other two meals that day should be less than the normal amount unless they are already at a minimum for good health. Eating between meals is not permitted; however, liquids including coffee, milk and fruit juices are allowed.

#### THE SACRAMENT OF PENANCE

Lately, we have been watching re-runs of the TV show, "Touched By an Angel." The show is centered around angels— Monica, Tess, Gloria and Andrew—sent by God to help those on earth to reconcile, forgive, and show compassion in their lives. At some point in the show, the angels reveal themselves to the characters and it is then there is usually an "a-ha" moment, the person asks for forgiveness and healing for their past sins, and their lives are changed. Ultimately, Andrew (the angel of Death) appears when one of the characters is taken by him to heaven but not before a reconciliation has taken place. Although a bit formulaic (we always know the end result), it leaves us with a positive view on the powerful virtues of reconciliation, forgiveness and mercy and how that can transform lives.

Instead of Angels, the Church gives Priests the authority to mediate our sins to God through the Sacrament of Penance. In John 20:19-23, Jesus appears to the Apostles in the Upper Room and says: "Receive the Holy Spirit; whose sins you shall forgive, they are forgiven them; and whose sins you shall retain, they are retained." This scripture forms the basis for the Sacrament as defined by the Catechism of the Catholic Church, which says: "In imparting to his apostles his own power to forgive sins the Lord also gives them the authority to reconcile sinners with the Church" (1444).

As a child, going to Confession (as we called it) was a regular part of the Catholic "playbook." Like many, I dreaded it. It was both anxiety-producing and



complicated—having to remember the prayers, recite a litany of sins (just how many times did I talk back, lie, or was mean to someone), and then categorize them into venial and mortal sins (the latter a sin you never wanted to think about)!

As a young adult, my view on the sacrament of Reconciliation didn't change much—until I began making yearly pilgrimages to the tiny village of Medjugorje, Bosnia-Hercegovina. Over there, going to Confession is as common as having cappuccino—it is part of the daily routine. In the early days of Medjugorje pilgrimages, there were no formal confessionals. The priests simply took a seat out in the open fields next to the church, and had a sign next to them letting people know what language they spoke (very important since they were from all over the world)! Unbeknownst to my mother, my sister and I would wander around the fields looking for an English-speaking priest who seemed nice and jovial (the Irish usually fit that bill)! Later on, when there were

actual confessionals built, we would base our choice of a priest on how fast the line moved, and the demeanor of those who left the confessional. If we went to different priests, we would compare notes on who got the easier penance! Somewhere along the way, however, I decided that going to confession was a GOOD thing—and I looked forward to it as much as I did attending Mass, saying the rosary—and yes, even drinking cappuccino.

Now, admittedly, it is much easier to go to Confession in a pilgrimage environment. On the other hand, in today's world there's no getting around it—we all sin— ALOT. And, just like the prodigal son in today's Gospel, when we sin we long to know again the loving embrace of a forgiving father awaiting our return. The Sacrament of Penance, therefore, is really just a tangible way to return us to God's open arms. Itself, the Sacrament consists of four parts: Contrition (being sorrowful for your sins); Confession (saying your sins out loud); Penance (given by the Priest, in reparation for your sins); and Absolution (prayer absolving your sins in the name of God). It makes sense, of course, that it is only after we have sought forgiveness and experienced the healing touch of Christ that we can forgive others. Perhaps St. Francis said it best: "It is in pardoning that we are pardoned." And just like an episode of "Touched By An Angel," that is when our lives are truly transformed.

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# God's Gift of Forgiveness

A Pastoral Exhortation on the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation

#### **Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:**

"Peace be with you!" With these words, the Risen Lord greeted his frightened Apostles in the Upper Room on the day of his Resurrection. They were troubled, anxious, and fearful—much like each one of us at some point in our lives. Christ repeated the words, "Peace be with you." But then he added, "Receive the holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them" (Jn 20:19-23).

What an extraordinary gift! The Risen Lord was proclaiming that all the suffering he had just endured was in order to make available the gifts of salvation and forgiveness. He wanted the Apostles to receive these gifts. He wanted them to become apostles of this forgiveness to others.


In the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, also called confession, we meet the Lord, who wants to grant forgiveness and the grace to live a renewed life in him. In this sacrament, he prepares us to receive him free from serious sin, with a lively faith, earnest hope, and sacrificial love in the Eucharist. The Church sees confession as so important that she requires that every Catholic go at least once a year. The Church also encourages frequent confession in order to grow closer to Christ Jesus and his Body, the Church. By the grace of the Holy Spirit, we seek forgiveness and repentance, let go of patterns

of sin, grow in the life of virtue, and witness to a joyful conversion. Since the graces of the sacrament are so similar to the purpose of the New Evangelization, Pope Benedict XVI has said, "The New Evangelization . . . begins in the confessional!"<sup>2</sup>

We bishops and priests are eager to help you if you experience difficulty, hesitation, or uncertainty about approaching the Lord in this sacrament. If you have not received this healing sacrament in a long time, we are ready to



welcome you. We, whom Christ has ordained to minister this forgiveness in his name, are also approaching this sacrament, as both penitents and ministers, throughout our lives and at this special moment of grace during Lent. We want to offer ourselves to you as forgiven sinners seeking to serve in the Lord's name.

During Lent—in addition to the various penitential services during which individual confession takes place—we bishops and priests will be making ourselves available often for the individual celebration of this sacrament. We pray that through the work of the Holy Spirit, all Catholics—clergy and laity—will respond to the call of the New Evangelization to encounter Christ in the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. Come to the Lord and experience the extraordinary grace of his forgiveness!

# How to Go to Confession...

May the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ, the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and of all the saints,

whatever good you do and suffering you endure, heal your sins, help you grow in holiness, and reward you with eternal life.

Go in peace.

-Rite of Penance, no. 93

- 1 PREPARATION: Before going to confession, take some time to prepare. Begin with prayer, and reflect on your life since your last confession. How have you—in your thoughts, words, and actions—neglected to live Christ's commands to "love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind," and to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Mt 22:37, 39)? As a help with this "examination of conscience," you might review the Ten Commandments or the Beatitudes (Ex 20:2-17; Dt 5:6-21; Mt 5:3-10; or Lk 6:20-26).
- 2 GREETING: The priest will welcome you; he may say a short blessing or read a Scripture passage.
- 3 THE SIGN OF THE CROSS: Together, you and the priest will make the Sign of the Cross. You may then begin your confession with these or similar words: "Bless me, Father, for I have sinned. It has been [give days, months, or years] since my last confession."
- 4 CONFESSION: Confess all your sins to the priest. If you are unsure what to say, ask the priest for help. When you are finished, conclude with these or similar words: "I am sorry for these and all my sins."
- 5 PENANCE: The priest will propose an act of penance. The penance might be prayer, a work of mercy, or an act of charity. He might also counsel you on how to better live a Christian life.

6 ACT OF CONTRITION: After the priest has conferred your penance, pray an Act of Contrition, expressing sorrow for your sins and resolving to sin no more. A suggested Act of Contrition is:

My God,
I am sorry for my sins with all my heart.
In choosing to do wrong
and failing to do good,
I have sinned against you
whom I should love above all things.
I firmly intend, with your help,
to do penance,
to sin no more,
and to avoid whatever leads me to sin.
Our Savior Jesus Christ
suffered and died for us.
In his name, my God, have mercy.

(Rite of Penance, no. 45)

- **7** ABSOLUTION: The priest will extend his hands over your head and pronounce the words of absolution. You respond, "Amen."
- 8 PRAISE: The priest will usually praise the mercy of God and will invite you to do the same. For example, the priest may say, "Give thanks to the Lord for he is good." And your response would be, "His mercy endures for ever" (*Rite of Penance*, no. 47).
- 9 DISMISSAL: The priest will conclude the sacrament, often saying, "Go in peace."

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
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
