RECYCLING PROGRAMS AT THE MADELEINE

The Madeleine's Laudato Si' Circle and Care for Creation Ministry have joined with U. S. based recycler, Terracycle, to offer our parish, school, and community opportunities to responsibly recycle specific items (primarily plastics) not generally handled at curbside. Terracycle has added more manufacturers to its program, and in turn, we have expanded our recycling offerings. Here is a current listing of what we are collecting. Please keep this in mind:

• Do not include garbage or items not specifically mentioned in the descriptions.

• Empty containers of contents. No need to wash first; ensure packaging is dry.



DISCONTINUED: STYROFOAM/ POLYSTYRENE

Regrettably, we can no longer accept Styrofoam and Polystyrene materials. Although endorsed by Metro, we have recently learned (through an independent report) of major violations by the local recycler in the responsible handling and recycling of these materials.

God's Surprises

Thoughts on John 20:11-18 • Easter 2022

The disciples returned to their homes, but Mary stood outside of the tomb crying."

Was Jesus there all this time...standing in the early morning shadows of the garden near the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea? Had he watched his friends come and go, eventually leaving in their frustration and disappointment? Did he know the heart of his beloved Mary Magdalene well enough, to know in advance, that she would be the one to linger in the garden after the others had left?

Did he know that she would be the one to let her sorrow and disappointment consume her? In the solitude of this beautiful garden at dawn, did Jesus know he would see tears streaming down her cheeks? Had he chosen her from the beginning to be the one to spread the news to the world that he was alive? She had waited patiently through the long Sabbath hours to return to the tomb and honor the body of her precious Jesus with fragrant spices and oils. She had suffered with the others through his slow, humiliating and painful death on the cross. Now all she wanted was to find his body.

Jesus stands in the shadows and watches her. He witnesses her pain. When the time is right, he surprises her and speaks her name. He is there, standing in front of her, his beloved Mary Magdalene, the dear friend he has chosen to be the first one to see him as the Risen Lord. Dear Mary Magdalene, that special friend with whom he had shared many conversations while walking together between towns, or over meals that lasted late into the night. It is Mary, in her darkest moment that Jesus chooses to surprise with his resurrected love, his light, his hope and his joy.

Like Mary Magdalene, Jesus waits for us in the shadows of our lives. He sees our tears and offers to wipe them away. He holds for each of us surprises beyond our wildest dreams. Mary Magdalene only planned to anoint his corpse with fragrant oil...not see him alive and hug his resurrected body! Be open to the surprises God has planned for you. As I was gathering my thoughts for this Reflection, the words from a hymn written by John Ylvisaker in 1985 came to my mind.

I was there to hear your borning cru. I'll be there when you are old. *I rejoiced the day you were baptized* To see your life unfold. When you heard the wonder of God's Word. *I* was there to cheer you on; You were raised to praise the living God To whom you now belong. *In the middle ages of your life,* Not too old, no longer young, *I'll be there to guide you through* the night Complete what I've begun. When evening gently closes in, And you shut your weary eyes, I'll be there, as I have always been With just one more surprise.

In Memorial

KATIE SCHARLE

A Funeral Mass was held for parishioner Katie Scharle on Saturday, April 23, at The Madeleine.

Catherine "Katie" Scharle, age 91, passed away on Good Friday, April 15, 2022 with her daughter Meg, son-in-law Dan, and three grandchildren, Teddy, Andrew, and Sarah Kate Gehred, at her side. Born on May 2, 1930 in Milwaukee, Wisconsin to Thomas Hugh Quiery, an immigrant from Belfast, Ireland, and Margaret Graham (Bartlett) Quiery, a registered nurse. Katie and her five siblings shared gifts of music, humor, and storytelling.

After graduating from St. Monica's grade school, she attended Holy Angels Academy, where she was elected Sodality Prefect her senior year. Upon graduation, Katie joined The Sisters of Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Dubuque, Iowa. Her first teaching assignment was at Our Lady of the Angels in Chicago, where she taught for six years. Months after assuming a new position in Iowa, she was called back to her original post after its historic 1958 fire killed 92 children, most of whom she had taught, and three of her nun friends, who died in heroic attempts to save their students. She taught by day and visited the families of the deceased children by night.

In 1959, the order asked for a volunteer to teach the deaf for Catholic Charities. Katie boldly stepped forward to Northwestern University to earn a master's degree in Education of the Deaf. She left the convent in 1969 to live and teach near Margie, her only sister and lifelong best friend. Set up on a blind date with Theodore Scharle, a philosophy professor at Bradley University, she found his "dancing needed help, but his personality was adorable." Their love took root in mutual admiration of each other's deep faith and goodness. They married on June 26, 1971.

Having moved to Peoria, Illinois, Katie supervised the education of children living with disabilities for the school district. She resigned her position after a year in the hope of having a baby, and at the age of 43 gave birth to their only child, Margaret (Meg) in 1973. She later mused, "For a moment I thought I heard some distant music and felt like reaching up and holding time still—where the first pure note is struck for the melody of a relationship." Her wonder at unanticipated motherhood never faded.

When Meg entered first grade, Katie commenced 19 years of teaching English at Peoria Notre Dame High School. She supervised the school newspaper and literary magazine and transformed her classroom into a hub for political action that sharpened student pens into swords: her class letters to newspapers and public officials sparked a media blitz that forced the nearby town to construct a new sewer system after many years of dumping raw sewage into the Illinois River. As Katie later wrote in her article published in English Journal, "We English teachers worry about teaching students to write, but we don't often give them much of significance to write about. We fret that they can't think, spell, and compose, but our assignments may be dull, lifeless, or abstract. Yet the real world is out there listening and waiting to hear their ideas and arguments."

Having retired from teaching in 1998, she brushed up on mathematics to become a real estate agent sourcing HUD loans for

low-income families. In 2004, when Meg and her husband Dan called from Portland, Oregon to announce their pregnancy, Katie and Ted exclaimed, "We are moving!" Settling in across the bridge in Vancouver, Washington, Katie served as president of the local chapter of the American Association of University Women, wrote letters to the editor, served as a delegate to the Washington caucus, sang in the church choir, and assumed



her central role as Meg's daily advisor. She taught all three grandchildren to read, delighted them with her stories, relished beating them in board games, and challenged them to live a life of service and faith.

Katie remained true to herself through many transformations, each turn catching the glint of Christ's light. She sparkled. To her, the world pulsed with stories, and even a chance encounter with a stranger opened a portal into a new world. Sitting next to her on a plane would change you forever-upon landing, you were almost certainly going back to school, switching careers, voting for a new candidate, or viewing a relationship in a new way. Bold and fearless in penetrating the depths of a person to draw out truth, she touched many. She experienced no barriers between herself and others: she even traveled to Europe with pocket-sized language dictionaries so that through a combination of hand gestures, laughter, and basic phrases she could continue engaging townsfolk across the continent. Anyone encountering her left with the feeling they had never met a person quite like her. Born without a dimmer switch and utterly ageless in her vitality, it almost seemed impossible that she could ever die, making her swift and gentle passage into eternal life on Good Friday so appropriate.

Preceded in death by her husband Ted, Katie is survived by her daughter Meg Scharle and her husband Dan Gehred, three grandchildren, Theodore, Andrew, and Sarah Catherine, sister Margaret Dittmann, brother Daniel Quiery, brother-in-law Thomas Scharle, and many adoring nieces and nephews.

Donations in her memory can be made to Catholic Charities, who funded her scholarship to Northwestern University to teach at their schools for deaf children, or to the Portland Rescue Mission.

BILL ROONEY

A Funeral Mass will be held for longtime parishioner Bill Rooney on Monday, April 25, 11:00 am at The Madeleine.

William F. Rooney, 87, of Portland, passed away April 14th. He was born in Springfield, Massachusetts to William F. and Lillian (Broderick) Rooney. The oldest of three sons, he grew up with brothers Paul and David in Massachusetts and Connecticut. Moving to Portland, he graduated from the University of Portland. His business career began with Georgia-Pacific Corporation and later Louisiana-Pacific Corporation in their Corporate Communications Department.

In 1962, Bill married Kathleen Walsh of Burlington, Iowa and together they raised five sons in a mellow 1915 Greek Colonial home in Northeast Portland. He authored six books, numerous magazine articles, was host for 15 years on a Saturday morning do-it-yourself radio show on KXL called Around the House with Bill Rooney, and for 15 years taught adult education courses at Portland Community College related to home improvement.

"When you have an older home, five active sons, and a parade of large rambunctious dogs, you quickly become a D-I-Y expert," Bill explained.

He spent as much time as possible in his workshop where he loved the smell of freshly cut wood and the magic of a keenlyhoned tool blade. He was an active amateur furniture maker, enthusiastic woodcarver, and a skilled wood turner who produced decorative and practical holiday gifts.

It was important to Bill to give back to his community and he served on a number of non-profit boards including SMACCO, Rebuilding Together, and The Madeleine Church Buildings and Grounds Committee. Later he applied his marketing skills mentoring small business owners through the SCORE Association.



He is survived by Kathleen, his wife

of 60 years, his brother Dave, sons Peter (Kimberly), Brian, Matthew, Michael, and Mark (Betsy). He is blessed with three granddaughters and two grandsons.



DIVINE MERCY Sunday

GOD'S MERCY IS FOR EVERYONE, ALWAYS

As we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday, Pope Francis reminds us that "Jesus said to St. Faustina, 'be merciful to everyone always' (December 24, 1937). *To everyone:* let us not think only of our interests, our vested interests. Now, while we are looking forward to a slow and arduous recovery from the pandemic, there is a danger that we will forget those who are left behind. The risk is that then we may be struck by an even worse virus, that of *selfish indifference*—a virus spread by the thought that life is better if it is better *for me*, and that everything will be fine if it is fine *for me*. It begins there and ends up selecting one person over another, discarding the poor, and sacrificing those left behind on the altar of progress.

"The present pandemic reminds us that there are no differences or borders between those who suffer. We are all frail, all equal, all precious. May we be profoundly shaken by what is happening all around us: the time has come to eliminate inequalities, to heal the injustice that is undermining the health of the entire human family! Let us learn from the early Christian community described in the Acts of the Apostles. It received mercy and lived with mercy: 'All who believed were together and had all things in common; and they sold their possessions and goods and distributed them to all, as any had need' (Acts 2:44-45). This is not some ideology: it is Christianity.

"In mercy, we find proof of how God loves us. God gives his entire self, always, freely, asking nothing in return. The salvation God offers us is the work of God's mercy and is for everyone. No human efforts, however good they may be, can enable us to merit so great a gift. God draws us to himself and makes us one with him. We too can love others as God has loved us, giving our lives for one another. Whoever experiences divine mercy, is impelled to be an architect of mercy among the least and the poor. Let us receive mercy and let us give mercy."



St. Faustina's Mission

Polish born Helena Kowalska (1905–1938), was the third of ten children. When almost twenty, she entered the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy, became Sr. Maria Faustina and devoted her life to the message of God's mercy. She traced her spiritual experiences with Christ in her diary, *Divine Mercy in My Soul.* She was canonized in 2000.

St. Faustina's life-long dedication to God's mercy was the direct result of her mystic encounter with Jesus, who gave her this mission. "Today I am sending you with my mercy to the people of the whole world. Speak to the world about my mercy. Let all mankind recognize my unfathomable mercy. Let them have recourse to the fount of my mercy. Let them profit from the blood and water which gushed forth for them. Before I come as a just judge, I first open wide the doors of my mercy. One who refuses to pass through the doors of my mercy must pass through the doors of my justice. Mankind will not have peace until it turns with trust to my mercy."

St. Faustina's Prayer

I want to be completely transformed into your mercy and to be your living reflection, O Lord. Help me, that my eyes may be merciful, so I may never suspect or judge from appearances, but look for what is beautiful in my neighbors' souls and come to their rescue. Help me, that my ears may be merciful, so I may heed my neighbors' needs and not be indifferent to their pains. Help me, that my tongue may be merciful, so I should never speak negatively of my neighbor, but have a word of comfort and forgiveness. Help me, that my hands may be merciful and filled with good deeds, so I may do only good to my neighbors by doing the difficult tasks. Help me, that my heart may be merciful so I may feel all the sufferings of my neighbor. Jesus, I trust in you!

Our Mission Today: Witnessing to God's Mercy

In *The Joy of the Gospel*, Pope Francis reminded us that the Church, which means each of us its members, is called to witness to the power of God's mercy to transform us and our world.

"The Church is a community of missionary disciples who take the first step, who are involved and supportive, who bear fruit and rejoice. An evangelizing community knows that the Lord has taken the initiative and has loved us first (1 John 4:19). Therefore we can move forward, boldly taking the initiative, going out to others, seeking those who have fallen away, standing at the crossroads and welcoming the outcast. Such a community has an endless desire to show mercy, the fruit of its own experience of the power of God's infinite mercy. Let us try a little harder to take the first step and to become involved by word and deed in people's daily lives, to bridge distances, to embrace human life and to touch the suffering flesh of Christ in others."

"Today there is need for people to be witnesses to God's mercy and tenderness. So many situations require our comforting witness. I am thinking of those burdened by suffering, injustice and tyranny; of those enslaved to money, to power, to success, to worldliness. We are all called to comfort our brothers and sisters, to testify that God alone can eliminate the causes of existential and spiritual tragedies. Any environment, even the furthest and most impractical, can become a place where our witness can bear fruit. There are no situations or places precluded from our Christian presence and witness. The witness that Jesus asks of us is not closed, but is open. It is in our hands."

What can each of us do today to be more merciful as Jesus was?

- Whom have I 'infected' with my faith and trust in God?
- How many people have I encouraged with my hope for a better life for all?
- How much love have I shared with those in my life?
- How might I take the first step to heal some broken relationship?
- How might I act to change in some small way the injustice I see around me?
