SAFETY, SECURITY, AND THE MADELEINE

Security at the Madeleine is an ongoing process. Site assessments have resulted in security improvements at The Madeleine School and in the Church. We cannot, however, place complete faith in better lighting, security cameras, or total lockdowns. We are, after all, a welcoming community. As parishioners, we must also take an active role in preparing for active threats, for our own security and that of our children and our fellow parishioners.

Be informed

Learning how to prepare is always the first step. The Department of Homeland Security has a number of resources, some specifically addressed to houses of worship, available for us. A good place to start is with "The Power of Hello," a method for practicing situational awareness and taking steps that may interrupt or prevent an active threat from escalating. Here's the link:

Be aware of your surroundings

Your ability to observe and assess your physical surroundings are key to good situational awareness. Where are the entry ways? The exits? If an exit is blocked, where's my next best route to safety? Playing out practical scenarios in your mind builds muscle memory that helps you react reflexively and responsibly.

What to do in an active threat

As an active threat unfolds, your options may be limited but they are clear: Run, Hide, or Fight. The Portland Archdiocese has provided a short video that effectively explains the Run, Hide, or Fight principle: www.bit.lv/tmp-rhf

If you haven't already done so, please take a moment to review and reflect on the video and how the information provided may guide future actions in case the worst happens. Think also about how it may better inform difficult conversations with family members and loved ones and so prepare them as well.

Be vigilant, not fearful

Tragedies like the recent shootings in Laguna, Buffalo, and now Uvalde, Texas, defy understanding and can quickly lead us into sadness, grief, anger, and fear. This is normal. It's what we do next that matters. We are, I believe, at a similar moment as the apostles in the aftermath of Christ's crucifixion: scared, isolated, unprepared for what comes next, barricaded behind a locked door. Yet imbibed with the Holy Spirit, they prepared themselves and carried Christ's love out to a waiting world confidant their actions would make a difference. So can ours.

TIPS FOR GREEN LIVING

What is the most environmentally-friendly fabric? Clothing is usually made of cotton or polyester. On the one hand, polyester comes from the petrochemical industry; on the other, cotton is grown under very polluting conditions. It requires large amounts of pesticides and water (one pair of jeans can require 10,000 liters of water). The best thing is to buy organically-grown cotton clothing. Other fabrics include linen, hemp cloth, and bamboo. Linen comes from the flax plant, which has been grown since Biblical times, and is very absorbent. Hemp is a robust plant that was grown by our ancestors and does not need pesticides. Hemp clothing is very durable. Bamboo is an excellent substitute for cotton: it grows quickly, without pesticides, is durable and naturally antiseptic. It is particularly good for underwear and handkerchiefs.

Theresa Emily Lamb was born August 16, 1928 in Seattle to Edwin S. Lamb and Vincenta Cowan Lamb. She grew up in Astoria and attended Star of the Sea elementary and high schools, and with only 7 in her class they all shared and enjoyed the various accolades and honors. She went to Marylhurst College, obtained a certificate in Education, and met many lifelong friends during that time.

While at Marylhurst she met Jim O'Hanlon, a University of Portland student, at a dance, and they soon fell in love. They married in 1951 and moved to Santa Clara where Jim was in law school. Terry taught at St. Clare's grade school in Santa Clara that year. In the summer of 1952 they returned to Portland, settling in SE Portland in Holy Family Parish. They began raising a family, and would have seven children.

In 1962 the growing family moved to a bigger house on Alameda in NE Portland as part of The Madeleine Parish. Terry continued to raise children, substitute teach at Madeleine school, and participate in community activities.

As time allowed, and when her children got older, Terry could spend more time on school and church activities. Madeleine, Jesuit, St. Mary's, Christ Child Society, and especially Marylhurst all enjoyed the benefits of her time and talent. She had a knack for organizing and delegating and she got things done. She served on the Board of Marylhurst College and received the Alumni of the Year award in 2010, chaired the Archbishop's Seminary Tea Committee and was the first woman to join the Serra Club. Later, Terry worked for years at the Arrangement where she enjoyed working with friends and meeting her neighbors.

Terry and Jim also enjoyed travel. In addition to their annual

trip to Kauai with friends every February, they would search out new places to visit, by themselves or often with the Serra Club. She always enjoyed meeting people and having a good conversation. Terry loved going to Cannon Beach and eventually built and decorated her home there with love.

Terry took care and pride in her family dinners even as the numbers grew to over 30 people, but she continued hosting with grace and style



until she and Jim downsized and moved to Courtyard at Mount Tabor in 2019.

Terry was the family historian. Somehow, she kept track of everything going on in everyone's lives. She was always there for her children, grandchildren, friends, and relatives to listen, counsel, and sympathize with their needs. She was a true joy to be with, and she will be missed.

MUSIC NOTES: PAY IT FORWARD

During the next couple of weeks there is a flurry of activity go-

ing on—not only in our nation, but in our church liturgical year. In the midst of it all, we celebrate two important liturgical milestones: The Solemnity of the Ascension and the Feast of Pentecost.

Now, I must admit that I have never really given Ascension much thought—and not understood why the church transfers the Solemnity from Thursday to Sunday in some states and not the others. The songs are not that remarkable or memorable to me—mostly, I have just glossed over

it and marched ahead to Pentecost Sunday, as I love singing about the Holy Spirit! But lately, I have to say that it is beginning to make more sense to me.

Officially speaking, the "Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord" is the fortieth day after Easter Sunday, and ranks right up there with the feasts of the Passion, Easter and Pentecost as among the most solemn in the liturgical year. It is the final component of the paschal mystery and—along with the resurrection, ascending body and soul to heaven is proof positive that Jesus was the Messiah.

Just as the disciples said goodbye to our risen Lord, we have all experienced saying goodbye to someone we love. For me, the death of my father, beloved family pets, and of late, a dear friend, my sister, and brother-in-law left me with feelings of "now what?" How do I honor, celebrate, remember those that I have loved in this earthly world? In other words, how do I pay it forward so that their life (and death)—and mine—continue to have purpose and meaning.

This must have been what the disciples felt when Jesus

ascended into heaven. He lived among them, loved them, was

their friend and taught them by word and example about the Kingdom of God. All the while he promised that he would send the Holy Spirit—to comfort them, and to be with them until the end of time. As promised, nine days after Jesus ascended body and soul to heaven, the Holy Spirit descended upon the disciples, and they were sent into the world to be witnesses to others. Pentecost became a way for the disciples to "pay it forward."

Often heard during these weeks is one my favorite choral motets (sacred songs), "If Ye Love Me," by the English composer Thomas Tallis. Published in 1565, the words are from the gospel of John: "If you love me, keep my commandments, says the Lord, and I will ask the Father and he will send you another Paraclete, to abide with you forever." The song is typical of the pure, homophonic style of the time. Each syllable is assigned a note—which makes both text and music easy to understand. Add to that subtle touches of color and movement and this motet comes to life. During Pentecost, the Holy Spirit unites all different languages into one. Michael Kissinger's song, "Fishermen of Men" is a rollicking gospel song reminiscent of a tent meeting revival. The song uses a different melody and lyric for each voice all singing at once—a kind of controlled chaos—until all voices join in unison on the words, "We are all his Fishermen of men."

Finally, as a nation this weekend we celebrate Memorial Day. Honoring those who have made the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom, we are called to "pay it forward" as we continue to strive for a world where God's love reigns eternal.


