EMBARKING ON THE APOSTOLIC JOURNEY

After the pilgrim Mass, all twenty-four of us gathered in the parish dining room to share a simple supper prepared by our own hands. When the last morsel was wiped from the stew pot with the last crust of bread, we returned to the church to pray together and recite Psalm 102, each of us, in our native language:

“As a father has compassion for his children, so has the Lord compassion for those who fear Him. For He knows our frame. He remembers that we are dust.”

Later, after cleaning up our supper dishes, we retired for the night, reposed on thin pads in the parish hall, strangers from Italy, France, Japan, Spain, and the United States, sleeping in God’s peace as brothers and sisters.

There is an ancient song that, once heard, pilgrims forever keep in their hearts: “E ultreia e suseia, Deus adjuva nos!” Like our pilgrim supper, it offers simple fare, a song celebrating determination and resilience imbibed by faith:

“Let us go further, let us go higher, with

God’s help!”

In a loud and calamitous world, it’s easy to feel uncomfortable, isolated, out of place. I think sometimes of the first apostles journeying to the far reaches of the world, walking to places as strange and distant to them as the moon might be to us. Yet they carried their faith with them, as pilgrims, embracing the journey. As Discerning Catholics, so can we. Come join us on an apostolic journey.

Our first face to face meeting will occur Sunday July 10th at 9:15, between the 8 AM and 10 AM masses, in the church courtyard. Our first meeting will be necessarily short, to meet and greet and prepare for our spiritual journey together as brothers and sisters in Christ. Green Tips for a More Sustainable Lifestyle

Mmm! The enticing smell of a barbecue! This summer activity reminds us of how our ancestors cooked. Even though it is not recommended, its impact on the environment can be reduced. First, don’t barbecue on days when there is a smog alert. Use a barbecue that suits your needs, buying a small one or lighting just one burner for smaller portions.

One 20-liter bottle of propane emits about 25 kg of CO₂. The type of fuel makes a big difference. Avoid flammable liquids. Charcoal and wood create a lot of soot; propane and natural gas aren’t much better. An electric barbecue is the most ecological option.

KEEP YOUR HAND ON THE PLOW!

I bet you thought that by now, the Church would just coast into summer. Well, think again! In Luke's gospel this week, Jesus reminds us, "No one who set a hand to the plow and looks to what was left behind is fit for the kingdom of God." In other words, now is not the time to sit back, soak up the sun, and rest on your laurels. NOW is precisely the time to stay focused and moving forward towards the kingdom.

There is no one who kept his "hand on the plow" more than St. John the Baptist, whose Feast Day is June 23. As one of the most significant and well-known biblical figures, God calls John the Baptist to pave the way for Christ—foreshadowed by the prophet Isaiah

who says: "in the desert prepare the way for the Lord; make straight in the wilderness a highway for our God." John knew and understood his role in salvation history and had a clear message for all those he encountered; "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is near." And while many believed John to be the Messiah, he was quick to say that he was just the messenger—always pointing the way towards Christ.

I am always reminded of John the Baptist when I hear the opening tenor recitative and aria from Handel's "Messiah." From Isaiah xi: 1-3, the tenor begins with a calm accompanied recitative that sets the tone for the passage, "Comfort ye my people." Towards the end of the recitative, the tenor exclaims, "the voice of him that crieth in the wilderness; Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God." This is punctuated with accented chords by the orchestra—and we are "off and running" with the aria, "Every Valley." In exuberant fashion, the tenor and orchestra carry on a musical dialogue with the words, "Ev'ry valley shall be exalted, and ev'ry mountain and hill made low"; the crooked straight, and the rough places plain." With long, melismatic phrases on the word "exalted" and alternating between short melodic turns and longer, smooth phrases on the words, "crooked" and "straight," the word painting here is exquisite. It is a true masterpiece!

The spiritual "Hold On" provides a different yet parallel

take on the life of John the Baptist. Composer Jester Hairston describes it this way: "I imagine this song was sung in revival meetings in the churches. During the 18th century in Baptist

churches they had what was called the mourners' bench... At one point in the service, one of the deaconesses from the "amen corner" would come over to this person on the mourners' bench. And she'd say, 'The only way son or daughter that you'll be able to reach heaven is to keep your hand on the plow.' When this lady spoke about the plow, she was using symbolism, and to her, the plow was symbolic of Jesus Christ. So she says, 'Listen here honey. If you're plowing with the plow in the field, you

hold on firmly to the handles and press down hard. You'll get a straight fertile. But if you take one hand off that plow and say, 'Hello cousin John' wavin' yah know 'Hello cousin Mary.' That plow is gonna wiggle honey and you'll be goin' down the wrong path'." In true Hairston style, this spiritual comes alive with its steady walking tempo, syncopated verses, and unison outbursts declaring, "Keep your hand on 'dat plow—hold on"!

P.S.—Look no further than Florence, Italy for the best celebration of the Feast of John the Baptist. As their Patron Saint, the day begins with an Historic parade to the Baptistry, followed by Mass in the Duomo. Years ago and quite by accident, my choir sang for Mass at the Duomo on that day—complete with Italian TV, the Cardinal of Florence, Florentine dignitaries, and an 8 sec. sound delay (yes, we counted), it was an extraordinary experience!

In the afternoon, the Piazza Santa Croce is transformed into a stadium (complete with sand and bleachers) for the popular Calcio storico fiorentino ("historic Florentine soccer"). The day culminates in a magnificent fireworks display from Piazzale Michelangelo.

As we celebrate the Feast of John the Baptist, may we always be reminded to keep our hands on that plow—and hold on!

The Liturgical Year



Solemnity of St. Peter & St. Paul

That Sts. Peter and Paul suffered martyrdom under persecutions in Rome is virtually certain. The legends about their death lack historical proof, but they make a great story:

Fire broke out in Rome in ad 64 under Nero, the emperor-violinist. Housing and places of amusement were destroyed. The people grew angry with Nero, who blamed the Christians for the blaze and persecuted them. To placate the people in their continuing distress, Nero ordered the death of Christianity's two greatest leaders, Peter and Paul, in the year 67.

When Peter heard about the growing persecutions, he fled Rome. But he saw a vision of Jesus walking back toward the city of Rome. "Where are you going?"

Peter asked. ("Quo vadis?") "To Rome, to be crucified again," Jesus mournfully replied. Peter, knowing he had to follow his master, turned about and went back to the city.

On the day of their execution, Peter and Paul met. Paul had been in prison in Rome, under house arrest. Since he was a Roman citizen he avoided the kind of death that awaited Peter—crucifixion in the city. Paul was to be beheaded outside the city walls. On June 29, Peter and Paul embraced on the Ostian Way. Peter marched north toward the public arena; Paul marched south outside the city gate. When Paul was beheaded, his head bounced three times. A spring of water gushed forth at each place. (The Monastery of the Three Fountains stands on the site today. The residents

make chocolate.) Since the main civic arena had been destroyed in the fire, Peter was crucified in a makeshift location. Claiming he was not worthy to be killed like his master, he was turned upside down on the cross. After he died, his body was buried in a pauper's grave. That grave is the site of the Vatican.

On June 29, we celebrate the Apostle of the Jews and the Apostle of the Gentiles. Together they brought the message of Christ to the world. So significant is their feast that in some countries it is a holiday of obligation. In the United States, when the feast falls on Sunday, it takes the place of the usual Ordinary Time liturgy. It helps us celebrate our mission to bring Christ to the world, no matter the cost.

By The Numbers

1 Giving History. So you don't have to dig through your bank records, these green bars show how much you've given each year, averaged by month for simplicity. Parish Offertory, Second Collections and Capital Repair gifts are used here. **These bars do NOT include Old Church Capital Campaign giving or pledges.**

2 Parishioner Average Giving. For context, we've provided the average monthly contribution per contributing parish family over each of the past 5 years.

3 Contact information. We have included what we have for your current contact information. See an error or a phone or email missing? Just make the correction when you send in your commitment card!

4 Suggested 2022-23 monthly amount. This is an amount for you to consider for your 2022-23 giving. It reflects the greater of your prior year monthly average plus our requested 6% increase, or the parish average. It's just a suggestion...we are grateful for any amount.

5 Your Commitment. Here, we list the commitments for the coming year.

▶ **Combined Monthly Commitment.** The amount here is intended to cover not only your Parish Offertory, the main fund that our parish runs on, but Second Collections and Capital Repair Fund also. **This does NOT include any gifts to our Old Church Project Capital Campaign.**

▶ **Additional Gifts:** If you did not include Capital Repair Fund and Second Collections in the past—or wish to add more—please consider including a monthly amount here.

▶ **Total Per Month:** Please TOTAL ALL THE LINES ABOVE for your total monthly commitment.

6 Method of payment: We are really hoping people will experience the convenience of automatic electronic payments this year. Complete instructions are on the back of your commitment card.

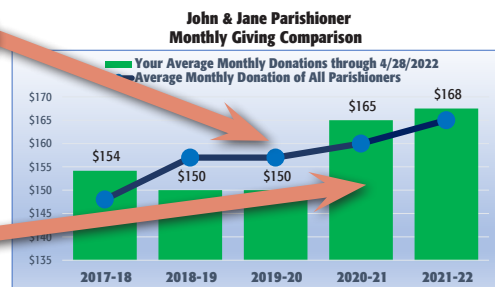
