the caretaking of our beautiful grounds.

Our "official" patroness is St. Mary Magdalene (July 22)—the patron saint of converts and women, and a legendary example of God's mercy and grace. She was there at the foot of the cross when Jesus died—and said to be the first to encounter the risen Christ in the garden.

It is fitting that St. Mary Magdalene first thought Jesus was the gardener. For Christ is the master gardener—bringing forth the first fruits of the Resurrection and cultivating new life in all who believe.

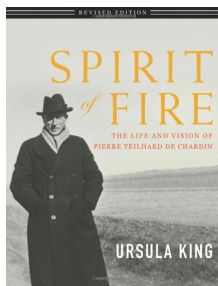

IN THE GARDEN:

OUR PARISH FEAST DAY CELEBRATION

Saturday, July 22 • Mass at 5:00 pm • Event in the courtyard afterward

Lately, I have been organizing my office—and came across several calendars and date books from past years. My latest magazine on organizing would tell me to let go of these outdated time management resources (otherwise known as calendars), and move on with my life. However, glancing at these calendars, they were filled with the events, travel, projects, and appointment reminders that represented my life. Scattered amidst them were those events and traditions that remained the same year after year—getting our Christmas trees on our wedding anniversary, producing our annual concert of Handel’s Messiah, celebrating family birthdays—and even the many blank pages during COVID—a stark reminder of when time stood still. More than just a calendar of dates, I realized these events helped give my life order and purpose. And so, instead of throwing them away, I tucked them neatly away in a drawer.

Of course, a calendar of events is not new. The early Church fathers first developed a liturgical calendar as a means for Christians to enter more fully into the paschal mystery—living and re-living the birth, death, and resurrection of Christ every year. Taking a cue from the book of Genesis, they organized it based upon weeks made up of seven days—six for work, and the seventh for rest and worship. This concept helped to give order and purpose to the early Christians and centuries later, to the rest of us.

Within that framework, the Church flanked the history of salvation on either side by the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, and Ordinary

Time. The Church also recognized that celebrating the lives of the saints was an important bridge to connect heaven and earth—thus, certain important Saints were added to the ever-growing list of ecclesiastical liturgical events. With so much to celebrate, the Church needed a hierarchical structure to commemorate these events. These holy days were characterized as: Solemnities (referring to the most important events in the life of Christ and the Church); Feast Days (honoring the saints and other important events in Christ’s life), and; Memorials (saints of lesser importance in the grand scheme, but nonetheless, still a saint). All of these encounters, both great and small, help to intertwine our human experiences with the divine—creating a “rhythm of life” with God at the center.

On Saturday, July 22, we will celebrate two very important saints in our lives as The Madeleine community—the Memorial of St. Kateri and the Feast Day of our Patron Saint, St. Mary Magdalene. Like all liturgical celebrations, we will begin with Mass—with music from our Madeleine Choir, and photos of parishioners’ own gardens. Immediately following, our evening will continue in our Madeleine Courtyard—with a reception of food and drink, and jazz and Broadway music by our Madeleine musicians and guest artists highlighting the beauty of God’s creation. Most of all—this is the perfect backdrop to welcome our new Priest Administrator, Father Bonaventure, to The Madeleine. We have MUCH to celebrate!

The Madeleine's Laudato Si' Circle and Care for Creation Ministry have joined with U. S. based recycler, Terracycle, to offer our parish, school, and community opportunities to responsibly recycle specific items (primarily plastics) not generally handled at curbside. Terracycle has added more manufacturers to its program, and in turn, we have expanded our recycling offerings. Here is a current listing of what we are collecting. Please keep this in mind:

- ▶ Do not include garbage or items not specifically mentioned in the descriptions.
- ▶ Empty containers of contents. No need to wash first; ensure packaging is dry.

Honoring Creation

When the days of creation came to completion, “God looked at everything he had made, and he found it very good,” the Book of Genesis states. The moon, the sun, the earth, the water, the land, everything that moves and lives in the air or on the land, including humankind, was completely fashioned, and in God’s eyes, it was very good!

This ancient story also tells us that humankind has greater responsibility than any other creature when it comes to cherishing and caring for the earth. Made in God’s image, we are not given the earth to exploit but to stand in authority over it on God’s behalf.

When you shop, talk about how things are packaged.

Pope Francis’ encyclical, *Laudato Si’* (Praise be to You) invites all of humanity to become conscious and active in caring for our common home. It is from Mother Earth that we receive all we need for life—our food, the water that replenishes us, and the air that we breathe. Distressed that we have neglected care of creation, the Holy Father observed that the earth “is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor” and called on us to work together to shape the future of our planet.

In our lives, how can we honor creation? Care begins at home. Start by looking at how you use natural resources. Even young family members can monitor how much they use water, for example. Discuss how leaving lights on and keeping the heat high affects fuel consumption in your home. What could your family do to use less energy? Will using more blankets at night help? Brainstorm!

Cutting back on waste is also kind to Mother Earth. Less refuse means smaller landfills. Be rigorous about recycling what you can, including bottles, cans, and paper. Can you give up prepackaged small water bottles in favor of reusable sippers? When you shop, talk about how things are packaged, and consider buying products that have less cardboard or plastic. Are there items you can borrow or rent rather than buy? Or toys and sporting equipment that you can give to others, so that they will buy less?



Families can discuss and share ideas on ways to care for creation.

Using our voices is one of the most powerful ways we care for creation. We can share ideas for how to reduce, reuse, and recycle in our schools and parishes. We can challenge others to avoid littering or to turn off the water if it’s running nonstop. We can educate others on issues and how to impact them by doing such things as planting milkweed to support rebuilding the monarch migration or hanging bat houses to protect vulnerable bats. God created the sky, and the sky is the limit in how we can become good stewards of the great gifts God has given us!

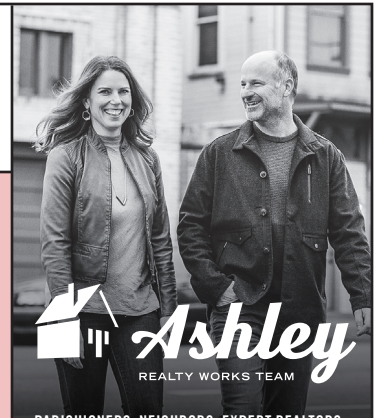

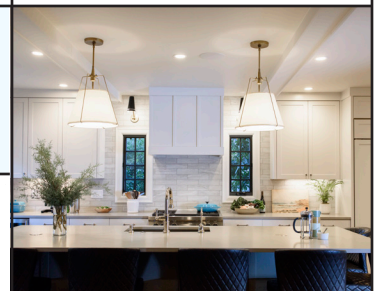
