

THE ASSUMPTION OF MARY— THE FRUITS OF THE HARVEST

MUSIC NOTES

On August 15, the Church celebrates the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary—commemorating the end of Mary's earthly life and assumption into Heaven. Considered one of the most important feast days of the year, it is a Holy Day of Obligation on the official Church calendar.

The Feast of the Assumption has its roots in early Christianity. According to St. John of Damascus, the Roman em-

peror Marcian requested the body of Mary, Mother of God at the Council of Chalcedon in 451. St. Juvenal, Bishop of Jerusalem at that time, told the emperor that "Mary died in the presence of all the Apostles, but that her tomb, when upon the request of St. Thomas, was found empty; wherefrom the Apostles concluded that the body was taken up to heaven." By the 8th century, the Church had renamed the feast day of the Memorial of Mary to the Assumption of Mary.

While the belief in Mary being assumed body and soul into heaven was a widely-held tradition for centuries, it was first codified into Canon Law as a Holy Day in 1917. However, it was not until 1950 that Pope Pius XII officially formalized the doctrine of the Assumption in his Apostolic Constitution Munificentissimus deus (The most bountiful God). In 1991, the Assumption of Mary made the short list of Holy Days with the USCCB-making this feast day one of six Holy Days of Obligation for American Catholics. While some see this as another day as, "I have to go to Mass," in many countries, it is a public holiday-and widely celebrated with street fairs, a religious procession, and even fireworks! It is also tradition to celebrate the Feast of the Assumption by bringing the summer harvest to be blessed. The first fruits (herbs, tomatoes, squash) are often associated with this feast-not only because of the time of year-but because Mary was the first believer in Jesus to experience the promised resurrection. Therefore, she is essentially the first "fruit" of a great coming harvest.



Admittedly, I am a big "Mary" fan-which I am sure is hereditary, as my mother led religious pilgrimages to Marian shrines for almost 40 years. In our foyer is a 3' Mary statue that she hand-carried from Medjugorje years ago. And we have a rosary collection that would rival most Marian shrines. (I am pretty sure we could say a rosary with different beads every day for a year.) Rather unintentionally, we also have

a garden full of tomatoes, herbs and summer squash.

In music, Marian hymns abound in both traditional and contemporary settings. Perhaps the earliest Marian hymn is the ancient chant setting of the Magnificat (known as the Canticle of Mary). My favorite choral setting is by J.S. Bach. Rooted in harmonic order, it conveys vivid imagery through orchestra colors, operatic flourishes and descriptive word painting. Bach thought of music as a donum Dei (gift of God), saying: "When there is devotional music, God with his grace is always present." Settings of the Ave Maria (devotional prayer to Mary) are also plentiful. Often, either the Schubert or Bach/Gounod versions are sung at both weddings and funerals. At the top of my list is the choral setting of the Bogoroditse Devo (Ave Maria) by Russian composer, Sergei Rachmaninoff from his "All Night Vigil." With its sublime harmonies, and a musical juxtaposition of both solemnity and rejoicing-it never fails to bring me to tears. Traditionally in the Church we sing Immaculate Mary on this day. Dubbed the "Lourdes Hymn," it was first written in 1973 by French priest Jean Gaignet, for pilgrims visiting the site of the apparitions of Our Lady of Lourdes.

This feast day is also important to me because two years ago on this very day, my sister went to be with Mary in Heaven. I cannot help but have visions of Mary taking her by the hand and leading her to eternal life—and my sister's beautiful voice singing the "Ave Maria" in praise and adoration. May she rest in peace.



The ASSUMPTION OF MARY The Promise of Things to Come

Mary's Assumption is the Roman Catholic doctrine that Mary the mother of Jesus, "having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory" by God. The Assumption is just one of only two papal declarations—the other being Mary's Immaculate Conception (1854)—that have been officially defined *"ex cathedra"* or "from the chair of Peter," that is, by a pope rather than by an ecumenical Council of all the bishops.

History of the Dogma

Although Mary's Assumption into heaven is not described in the Bible, various sermons and devotions as early as the 6th century indicate that many of the faithful believed that it was true. Medieval theologians like St. Thomas Aquinas and St. Bonaventure put forth arguments to validate it. But it had never been formally defined as a dogma by the Church's teaching authority. So after consulting with the Church's bishops throughout the world who overwhelmingly concurred that the Catholic faithful did indeed believe the Assumption to be true and the time right for an official declaration, Pope Pius XII solemnly declared the Assumption to be an infallible dogma of the Church on November 1, 1950, and its celebration was assigned to August 15.

Mary Our Model

After Jesus' death, God rewarded Jesus' faithfulness to God's ways of justice and love by raising him to new life with God. Jesus promised that we who follow him faithfully would also join him in this new life. By declaring Mary's Assumption into heaven, the Church affirms that Mary has already received the new life with God that Jesus promised. "The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin is a singular participation in her Son's resurrection and an anticipation of the resurrection of other Christians. By her complete adherence to the Father's will, to his Son's redemptive work, and to every prompting of the Holy Spirit, the Virgin Mary is the Church's model of faith and charity" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church,* #966–67).



Mary Shows Us the Way

Mary's Assumption is a celebration of the triumph of God's justice over human injustice, the victory of grace over sin. In one of his homilies, Pope Francis reminded us of the importance of Mary's Assumption for each of us. "Mary's Assumption is a great mystery which concerns each one of us. It regards our future. Mary, in fact, precedes us on the path walked upon by those who, through their baptism, have bound their life to Jesus, as Mary bound her own life to him. This feast makes us look to heaven, foretells the 'new heaven and new earth,' with the risen Christ's victory over death and the definitive defeat of evil. Therefore, the exultation of the humble maiden of Galilee, expressed in her Magnificat prayer (Luke 1:46-55), becomes the song of all humanity, which sees with satisfaction the Lord stoop over all men and all women, humble creatures, and assume them with him into heaven. Because Mary received and lived the gospel, she is beside her son's throne for eternity."

Mary's Song of Hope for a Better World

The *Magnificat* is the popular name for Mary's song in the Gospel chosen for the Feast of the Assumption. Inspired by the Old Testament song of Hannah, the mother of Samuel (1 Sam 2:1-10), it expresses her maternal joy and hope for a better world for her child because of God's concern for the poor and action for justice. As Pope Benedict XVI explains in his encyclical letter God Is Love (Deus Caritas Est, #41), "The Magnificat-a portrait of Mary's soul-is entirely woven from threads of Scripture. Here we see how completely at home she is with God's Word, moving with ease in and out of it. She speaks and thinks with God's Word, which becomes her word, and her word issues from God's Word. We see how her thoughts are attuned to God's thoughts, how her will is one with God's will. Since Mary is completely imbued with God's Word, she can become the Mother of the Word Incarnate. Finally, Mary is a woman who loves. How could it be otherwise? As a believer who in faith thinks with God's thoughts and wills with God's will, she cannot fail to be a woman who loves."

Mary's Magnificat Prayer (Luke 1:46-55)

"My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my savior. For he has looked upon his handmaid's lowliness; behold, from now on will all ages call me blessed. The Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. His mercy is from age to age to those who fear him. He has shown might with his arm, dispersed the arrogant of mind and heart. He has thrown down the rulers from their thrones but lifted up the lowly. The hungry he has filled with good things; the rich he has sent away empty. He has helped Israel his servant, remembering his mercy, according to his promise to our fathers, to Abraham and to his descendants forever."
