In today's readings Jesus' apostles ask him how to pray. His response is the prayer we now frequently pray. I invite you this week to gather your family and pray this prayer slowly, pausing to allow each line to come from your heart:

Our Father...

pause Who art in heaven...

pause

Hallowed be Thy name...

pause...etc.

It is so easy to get so used to praying this prayer that we say the words without paying attention to the deep desires we are expressing.

LENTEN RICE BOWLS

Each Lent, Catholic families across the country unite to put their faith into action through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Through CRS Rice Bowl, families learn about how our sisters and brothers across

the globe overcome hardships like hunger and malnutrition, and how through Lenten alms, we have the power to make the world a better place for all.

Rice Bowls are available in the church. Please be generous during Lent, then return them to the church on Holy Thursday.

LENTEN FASTING & ABSTINENCE

From the Archdiocese: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. For members of the Latin Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59.

When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Latin Catholic Church from age 14 onwards. Members of the Eastern Catholic Churches are to observe the particular law of their own sui iuris Church.

If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily his Resurrection.

REPENT: A LAUDATO SI' LENTEN EXAMEN FOR DAILY USE

As Lent begins, unfolds, and concludes, view prayer not as an abstract exercise but as a call to action.

Prayer is action that grounds our lives spiritually. Let the Creator Spirit guide you as you seek to live this Lenten season more intentionally in the light of Laudato Si.'

Each week of Lent we will publish a different passage from Laudato Si' and a prompt for reflection.

Second Sunday of Lent (February 25).

"The Lord was able to invite others to be attentive to the beauty that there is in the world because he himself was in constant touch with nature, lending it an attention to full of fondness and wonder." (Laudato Si' 97)

Reflect: Listen to God's beloved Son and how he teaches us to contemplate the beauty of Creation. How does the way of living and the actions of Jesus Christ in the Gospels inspire you to be more in touch with the Earth and the poor?

FOR A SYNODAL CHURCH: COMMUNION, PARTICIPATION, AND MISSION

Ever since the 2nd Vatican Council, the Bishop of Rome—the Pope—has convoked a regularly scheduled gathering of bishops to assist him in his role as universal pastor of the Church. These gatherings are the Synod of Bishops.

In October 2023 and in a second session in October of 2024, Pope Francis has asked bishops, some priests, and laity from around the world to gather in an a synod assembly to discuss the nature of the Church, which in Pope Francis's view is synodal by nature.

In preparation for the synod assembly in Rome, the Synod of Bishops—an office in Rome—asked for input from local churches around the world—a local church in Catholic parlance is not a parish church, but a church gathered around a diocesan bishop. In Portland, as in many places, our bishop asked parishes to hold listening sessions. And here at The Madeleine, several parishioners gathered to give their input on certain questions.

Along with contributions from every parish in Oregon, The Madeleine's contribution was prayed through and then a summary document made its way through several phases (bishops conference, continental, and universal). The goal has always been to listen to the Holy Spirit who speaks through the multitude voices of the people of God.

Some people have wondered how The Madeleine's contribution—your contribution—made its way to the Holy Father. Without any study, I can say the answer is imperfectly—because by nature human communication is imperfect. We are after all, one voice among many hundreds of millions of voices in many diverse cultural contexts.

Many people have viewed this process as a kind of global parliament, and our contribution as a vote, which has either been "received in Rome," or if not has left the voter disenfranchised. I suggest to you, rather, that this whole exercise is a lesson in learning to hear the voice of the Holy Spirit, who continues to govern the Church. Each of us should be focused on this voice, and not so much on our own voice.

The first step in participating in the Synod should be for each of us individually to open a serious conversation with God. We all pray in different ways, and many of us are only learning to pray with a listening ear. The thing of interest to the Church is not my opinion or your opinion on various topics, but rather what is it that you hear God speak in your personal prayer on a given topic—this is endlessly fascinating.

Judging by my own experience, what you or I "heard" is maybe 10% the Holy Spirit and 90% our own voice or some mixture thereof.

When two or three gather together and prayerfully share with each other what we heard God say in prayer, we can listen again to each other in conversation and hear more clearly as a group what it is that God is speaking to the Church. As these conversations take place throughout the Church at various levels and finally in the synod assembly itself, it is the Pope's hope that we will be able to understand—that the Pope will be able to understand—how the voice of the Holy Spirit is moving the Church in our day.

These conversations continue. The Synod of Bishops has asked various continents and regions to take up certain questions in prayer and to carry the answers received in prayer through to the synod assembly in Rome that will meet in October.

At The Madeleine, we will do our part by hosting a synodal session of our own on March 2, 2024. Please sign up at www.themadeleine.edu/synod

It will begin with a Holy Hour of Eucharistic Adoration in the Church at 1:00 pm, where we can listen in prayer to what the Holy Spirit is speaking to us. But I suggest we begin to pray even now. From 2:00-4:00 we will gather in the Parish Hall—or the Fireside Room—for the first hour in small groups, sharing with each other what we heard in prayer. And then as a larger group, sharing with the whole floor what we heard from the small groups.

The Pastoral Council will generate a document that we will send to the Archdiocese, and it will make its way to Rome through the filter of many layers once again.

I invite you to explore the synod and the documents that the synod generated at www.synod.va

The questions that we were asked to consider are these:

- 1. Where have I seen or experienced successes and distresses-within the Church's structure(s)/organization/leadership/life that encourage or hinder the mission?
- 2. How can the structures and organization of the Church help all the baptized respond to the call to proclaim the Gospel and to live as a community of love and mercy in Christ?

So, let us begin with prayer.

MUSIC NOTES

GOSPEL MUSIC—WHERE FAITH, MUSIC & CULTURE JOIN

Last August, we had the legendary gospel group, Blind Boys of Alabama perform at our 23rd annual Vancouver Wine & Jazz Festival for the third time. Although the roster has changed, (founding member Clarence Thomas died in 2018 and longtime member Jimmy Carter just retired at age 91), they have stood the test of time-winning their sixth Grammy award for Best Roots Gospel Album-and remain among the best cross-over artists of gospel music of the past 85 years. I never tire of hearing their toe-tapping trademark, "I Shall Not Be Moved" and rendition of "Amazing Grace" set to the tune of "House of the Rising Sun." In the words of band member Ricky McKinnie; Our disability doesn't have to be a handicap. It's not about what you can't do. It's about what you do. And what we do is sing good gospel

At its core, gospel music is a distinctly American art form—its musical roots firmly planted in both the traditional spiritual and protestant hymnody of the late 19th century. Sharing a common theme of Christianity, gospel music has developed largely along musical and cultural lines. In the words of musicologist Robert M. Stevenson, "Gospel hymnody has the distinction of being America's most typical contribution to Christian song. ...It is the music of the people,"

At the turn of the 20th century, gospel music centered around white churches. Musically, it was usually verse/refrain, in a major key, and arranged in four-part harmony, all the while utilizing three basic chords. Its texts were about personal spiritual experiences and the importance of salvation. Led by such pioneers as Phillip Bliss, Dwight Moody, Ira Sankey, and the Carter Family, southern gospel music (as it was called) began to incorporate Appalachian and other country music traditions—making the hymns livelier and more accessible.

Similarly, early gospel music in the

Black church (called "traditional" gospel music) incorporated musical elements of ragtime, blues, and jazz. At the forefront were musicians such as Thomas Dorsey, dubbed the "Father of Gospel Music," who fused together blues-style improvisatory melodies and harmonies, with sacred texts where Christ offered "earthly solutions" to daily struggles. Initially rejected by Black ministers as being too secular, Dorsey partnered with singer Mahalia Jackson and together, they took gospel music out of the church and into the streets.

As the century progressed, gospel music continued to evolve into the mainstream, following divergent paths but never losing sight of its musical and spiritual foundations. Some of the most influential artists inherently drew musical inspiration from their own connections to religion and the church. Elvis Presley's music was rooted in the music he heard in church as a child, and the all-night gospel sings he attended as a Memphis teenager. Listen to his gospel album sometime and you can tell that is where is heart was. Aretha Franklin sang at her father's Baptist church as a child-creating her own musical style that weaved together the best of traditional gospel and contemporary music—and unabashedly proclaiming her faith throughout her 62-year career. Suffice to say that countless other Country, Soul, R&B, and Rock n' Roll singers from Johnny Cash to Little Richard helped to create a new kind of gospel music that had deep-rooted universal appeal. Even today, the influence of gospel music can be felt in some of the biggest stars of R&B, hip-hop, Christian pop, and country music.

Just like the legendary "Blind Boys of Alabama," gospel music has stood the test of time—as it was, is, and always will be American-made, faith-inspired music that continues to transcend culture, race, and religion across the globe.


