PARISH LIFE

A note from Fr. Bonaventure about the upcoming election

Dear Madeleine Family,

I'm actually loath to speak about politics at Mass. I prefer the Church to be a safe place where the hyperbolic anxieties of the election season do not hold sway. With the grace of God, we as a Church can rise above the fray, but I would like to share with you some of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, to inform your political decisions, and, if I may, I would encourage you to make a simple decision and be at peace with it. I've bolded some sections for emphasis:

▶ Paragraph 2240: Submission to authority and co-responsibility for the common good make it morally obligatory to pay taxes, **to exercise the right to vote**, and to defend one's country:

Pay to all of them their dues, taxes to whom taxes are due, revenue to whom revenue is due, respect to whom respect is due, honor to whom honor is due.

[Christians] reside in their own nations, but **as resident aliens**. They participate in all things as citizens and endure all things as foreigners.... They obey the established laws and their way of life surpasses the laws.... So noble is the position to which God has assigned them that they are not allowed to desert it.

The Apostle exhorts us to offer prayers and thanksgiving for kings and all who exercise authority, "that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life, godly and respectful in every way."

▶ Paragraph 2241: The more prosperous nations are obliged, to the extent they are able, to welcome the foreigner in search of the security and the means of livelihood which he cannot find in his country of origin. Public authorities should see to it that the natural right is respected that places a guest under the protection of those who receive him.

As Catholics, our homeland is not this country of the United States. We live here, but we long for our true homeland in heaven. While we are not too tied to this place, we try to make it better. The Catechism continues:

- ▶ Paragraph 2245: The Church, because of her commission and competence, is not to be confused in any way with the political community. She is both the sign and the safeguard of the transcendent character of the human person. "The Church respects and encourages the political freedom and responsibility of the citizen."
- ▶ Paragraph 2246: It is a part of the Church's mission "to pass moral judgments even in matters related to politics, whenever the fundamental rights of man or the salvation of souls requires it. The means, the only means, she may use are those which are in accord with the Gospel and the welfare of all men according to the diversity of times and circumstances."

I wish you all a peace-filled, honest, and fruitful election season!

MUSIC AT THE MADELEINE

Why sing? God gave everyone the gift of song. We sing before we speak.

Music, especially song, is the most human of the arts. It needs no materials or tools other than the ear and throat – along with mind and heart. - Learn how to be a "team player", social skills, and manage emotions.
- Develop self-esteem and confidence.
- Are more likely to participate in sports and other activities.
- Help children engage in their school or church.

Children who sing in their church choir...

- Are more likely to stay active in their church as a teen and adult.
- Internalize biblical principles by memorizing faith-based songs they learned as a child.
- Give much value to both children and adults in their worshipping community.

Adults who sing in a choir...

- Strengthen feelings of community and social well-being.
- Help regulate their heart beat through group singing.
- Reduce their stress levels and feelings of depression.
- Improve their lung capacity.

- Volunteer more significantly than the general public.
- Become better "team players" and leaders in their outside activities.
- Build confidence in their daily lives.







We Are Called to Holiness of Life


Or centuries prior to Vatican Council II (1962–65), the common understanding of saints identified those men and women whom the Church had singled out as exemplary Christians and whose names had been listed in the official list of saints. They had been "canonized" and were privileged with the official title of *Saint*.

But the Bishops gathered at Vatican II recognized that through our baptism, each of us was called to be holy (1 Cor 1:2) so we are all meant to be holy women and men—saints. "All the faithful of Christ of whatever rank or status are called to the fullness of the Christian life and to the perfection of charity. By this holiness a more human way of life is promoted even in this earthly society" (*Dognatic Constitution on the Church, #40*).

While at first we might think that this was a new teaching, we now realize that it was an attempt to reemphasize the ancient mentality of the earli-

est Christians. From its very beginning, the Church understood the Body of Christ to encompass all baptized persons, both the living and the dead. Christ's kingdom transcends time and space, and not even death can sever the relationship that the faithful have in Christ. All are united in a mystical communion with Christ (the "communion of saints" that we affirm whenever we proclaim the Creed at Mass) by virtue of baptism (1 Cor 6:11). St. Paul often addresses those to whom he writes as "holy ones" (saints) to designate all baptized Christians (see Rom 1:7, 15:25; 2 Cor 1:1; Eph 1;1; Phil 1:1).

And in fact the call to be holy in God's covenant community goes back even further to the Old Testament to God's instruction to Moses on Mt. Sinai to "Speak to the whole Israelite community and tell them: Be holy, for I, the LORD your God, am holy" (Lev 19:2). Thus being in a relationship with God obliges us at its most basic level to be holy, to be saints.



All Saints' Day November 1

This feast, honoring all the saints of the Church, known and unknown, provides an opportunity to reflect on our personal call to holiness and to celebrate the exemplary faithfulness of holy men and women of every place and time, whose lives and deeds continue to inspire us. It was given this date to counter a pagan feast held to appease the dangerous evil spirits associated with the coming of winter and darkness whose customs still linger today in our celebration of Halloween (meaning All Hallows' [= Holy Ones, Saints | Eve).

All Souls Day November 2

This feast remembers the many nameless and forgotten persons like our deceased family and friends who led us to Christ and into the communion of his mystical Body. It purposely follows All Saints' Day to shift our focus from the recognized saints to ordinary people, especially those who might need our prayers. From the earliest times, Christians prayed for the dead and many monasteries adopted the tradition of remembering all the faithful departed. Eventually this custom spread throughout Europe and was included into the Church's liturgical calendar.

Honoring Saints in the Early Church

Honoring saints began in the early Church by remembering the martyrs who by their courageous witness had imitated Jesus' faithfulness to God's ways even to death. Local churches kept a record of their own martyrs and each year set aside certain days to remember and celebrate their "birthdays," the dates of death when they were "born" into eternal life.

Their practice is illustrated today in the First Eucharistic Prayer of our Mass, which was the standard prayer adopted in the eighth century liturgical renewal of the Holy Roman Emperor Charlemagne. After Mary and the apostles, the prayer recalls the men and women martyrs of the first three centuries, "Linus, Cletus, Clement, Sixtus, Cornelius, Lawrence, Chrysogonus, John and Paul, Cosmos and Damian, Ignatius, Alexander, Marcellinus, Peter, Felicity, Perpetua, Agatha, Lucy, Agnes, Cecilia, Anastasia and all the saints." By the fourth century many parts of the Church had set aside special days to remember not only their distinguished martyrs but also "confessors" (those who had witnessed and been punished for their faith but did not die), virgins and those whose example was especially helpful for becoming better Christians.

The many local lists of these exemplary saints grew and soon included persons from all walks of life—popes and bishops, clergy, religious and laity, men, women, and children (e.g., the holy Innocents Dec 28), single and married. Finally in 1583 they were collected into a single book called the *Roman Martyrology*, the official list of saints venerated by the Church arranged according to the calendar. Additions to the list are made when new saints are officially beatified and canonized and the days for their memorial are determined.



Praying to the Saints

From the earliest times, Christians believed that members of the Christian community, though separated by death but now alive in Christ, were still able to help one another. "Being more closely united to Christ, those who dwell in heaven fix the whole Church more firmly in holiness. They do not cease to intercede with the Father for us, as they proffer the merits which they acquired on earth through the one mediator between God and humanity, Christ Jesus. So by their fraternal concern is our weakness greatly helped" (*Dogmatic Constitution on the Church*, #49). Thus the importance of the saints as intercessors for us with God became more popular.

The identification of saints as mediators with God introduces their role as patron saints, that is, one to whom we can go when we have specific needs that require help. Saints are designated as patrons or special advocates for nations, churches, places, crafts, activities, jobs, classes, clans, families, illnesses, causes, etc. Most patrons have been so designated as the result of popular devotion and long-standing custom. The Church has officially designated rather few patrons, and most patron designations, especially more recent ones, are unofficial.


