Ciszek, SJ, Triple Novena, Extraordinary Experiences, Powerful Prayer) edited by Marc Lindeijer, SJ, and Rosemary Stets, OSF. They knew Fr. Ciszek after his return from 23 years in prisons in Russia. The book offers a triple novena with his reflections from 3 settings: Lubyanka Prison, the work camps, and the town of Norilsk.


I invite you to pray these novenas with me and ask for the intercession of Fr. Walter

They have a lovely music-led communal hour of adoration every week at that time. Fr. Matt Libra, the pastor there, and Fr. Tony Galati from St. Charles, and now I offer the Sacrament of Reconciliation (confession) during adoration. I am committed to this as a weekly ministry.

For those of you who are looking forward to receiving the Sacrament of Reconciliation


Benefits Children of Incarcerated Parents & Community Transition School

The tradition of The Madeleine Giving Tree will continue this year and the need has never been greater. This year we will be supporting two worthwhile and grateful organizations.

Northwest Family Services Children of Incarcerated Parents—These children face countless barriers including abuse, neglect, homelessness and food insecurity, as well as having one or both parents incarcerated.

Community Transitional School—CTS serves students ages 4-14 from Multnomah County who live in homeless and domestic violence shelters, cheap motels, on the floor of a friend's home and even inside of their cars. Some are from families that are on the brink of losing their housing; others have just recently managed to move into permanent housing. All children are in situations where poverty and uncertainty dominate much of their young lives. Please read the tags carefully for this group...due to their mobile nature, the tags indicate specific needs. **IMPORTANT NOTE: Each of these CTS tags has many gift ideas listed for each child, along with clothing and shoe sizes. Feel feel free to just choose a single item on the child's gift tag lists. If you wish more, that's OK too. Most important is that every child receives at least one gift.**

Tags have been hung on the tree in the Parish Hall driveway. Get there early...they get claimed very quickly!

In Memorial

THE MADELEINE FAMILY REMEMBERS

Bennett Carl Ford

Funeral Mass • Thursday, December 5 • 11:00 am

A Funeral Mass will be held for Madeleine parishioner Ben Ford on Thursday, December 5, 11:00 am at The Madeleine.

Ben was the first-born child of Harold Bennett Ford and Helen Bernadine Kirchner. He arrived at the St. Joseph's Infirmary in Louisville KY on March 15, 1940. Ben was joined by his brother Robert (Bob) in 1942 and later by his sister Susan in 1943. As a child Ben attended the Saint Denis School through 8th grade, and thereafter completed his high school education at Saint Thomas Seminary in preparation for his formation into the priesthood. Shortly after graduating high school he decided on an alternate life path and instead earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from Bellarmine University in 1963.


Ben subsequently initiated his Masters degree studies in American History at the University of Arizona where he was also heavily involved in the formation of Newman Centers in the region. Life in the southwest was a bit more than the Kentuckian could handle, and so he returned home without completing his degree. In the mid 60s the Vietnam conflict was escalating and many men of Ben's age were being drafted to serve in the armed forces. Instead of waiting to be called up, he enlisted with the United States Air Force and was stationed at Andrews Air Force Base in Marvland. Ben served as a psychiatric ward specialist for 4 years, and achieved the rank of Sergeant before being honorably discharged. During his time at Andrews he assisted with social functions for the benefit of patients, events that were co-sponsored by the American Red Cross. It was during one of these functions that he met a Red Cross volunteer named Mary-Louise Meyer. They quickly became close companions, and were married in November of 1968. According to Ben, Mary-Louise convinced him to accompany her to an antique shop one afternoon only to find himself purchasing a ring for a potential future engagement. The ring was on her finger before they got back to the car, but Ben did not seem to mind.

Ben and Mary-Louise welcomed their first son Thomas in 1970, and shortly thereafter moved to Lexington so that Ben could work towards his Masters degree in Library Science at the University of Kentucky. Around the same time Ben finished the outstanding coursework for his advanced degree in American History at Murray State University. In 1973 Ben and Mary-Louise brought their second son Matthew into the world. Ben then moved with his family to Lawton OK where he took a job as a librarian at Cameron University.

In addition to his career as an academic librarian, Ben maintained a high level of engagement as a husband and a father. When Wilson elementary school (where his children attended) sought new leadership for the Parent Teacher Association he and Mary-Louise stepped in as copresidents. When his son Thomas and his classmates sought to form a basketball team he agreed to lead them as their head coach. When his son Matthew's troop of Boy Scouts became leaderless, he assumed the role of Scout Master. When Mary-Louise struggled with her first bout of breast cancer he absorbed many of the household duties and drove his wife to her chemotherapy appointments. Ben may not have always known what he was doing when first taking on these roles, but he stepped up and made a difference when it mattered the most. Ben was a provider for his family and leader in his community.

In the early 1980s Ben and his family relocated to Ramsey NJ for his new job opportunity as a librarian at Fairleigh Dickinson University. The next few years proved challenging as Mary-Louise struggled with recurring bouts of cancer, a disease she succumbed to in 1987. Ben suddenly found himself a single father of two teenage boys. He adjusted his work schedule by taking on a new librarian role at Bergen Catholic High School, which allowed him to spend evenings and summers at home with his sons. It was during these years that Ben also became an active Catholic again, eventually assuming facilitator roles for multiple bible study groups each week.

Ben retired in his early 50s. relocated to northeastern PA outside Scranton, and then dedicated the next two decades of his life to various pursuits of spiritual development. This includ-



ed continuing to facilitate multiple bible study groups, participating in prison ministry at the Lackawanna County Prison, organizing and speaking at Cursillo weekend retreats, and preparation of catechists as part of the leadership team for the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). Ben also became certified as a spiritual director to help others along their spiritual journeys. During these spiritual pursuits Ben met his second wife Joan Abbitt, whom he married in 1995. Joan died unexpectedly in the summer of 1997.

In 2011 Ben relocated to the Portland area to be near his son Matthew and his family. He remained active in church life at St. Anthony of Padua Catholic Church in Forest Grove, St. Matthew's in Hillsboro, and The Madeleine in northeast Portland. He happily picked up his granddaughters from The Madeleine School for years while he was still physically able, and struck up conversations with any parent, grandparent, or teacher that crossed his path.

Ben passed away in his sleep during the early morning hours of November 17, 2024. He is survived by his sons Thomas and Matthew, his daughter-in-laws Jennifer and Windy, and his five grandchildren Nora, Louisa, Colin, Amelia, and Lauren.

ADVENT THREE COMPANIONS FOR OUR JOURNEY

The Season of Advent makes our journey toward Christmas more meaningful by revealing our deepest longings and greatest hopes, and teaching us to focus all our desires on Jesus Christ. Advent celebrates three dimensions of Christ's coming—first into the world some two thousand years ago, second into our hearts right now, and finally in his coming at the end of time.

As you journey through Advent, you will begin to understand Jesus more fully and recognize that his birth began our redemption and that his return in glory will complete it. Advent draws together the joy of his arrival as a helpless babe with the hope of his return when evil will finally be eradicated from our world.

Advent also presents us with three companions for our journey who speak to us about matters of the heart—about longing, fulfillment and hope.

Isaiah

The great prophet foretold the coming of the promised Messiah and his kingdom. Isaiah's words are remembered especially during Advent because of his confident hope that God would restore the faithful remnant of Israel to live as God's renewed covenant community in their land.

John the Baptist

John announced to the people that Jesus, the Messiah, had finally come and now was the time to change their lives. While some thought John might be the Messiah, he knew clearly that he was only the messenger and Jesus was the promised one. When we look carefully at our lives and those of others, we learn what we must change to follow him.

Mary

Mary was transformed by God's grace from the first moment of her existence, which we celebrate on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. Then when invited to share in God's plan, Mary accepted her role as Jesus' mother. Her willingness to allow God to work in her life is a model for us in a culture that often refuses to acknowledge God and fears to make any commitment.

Origins of Advent

Advent began sometime after the 4th century as a time of preparation for Epiphany—not in anticipation of Christmas. Epiphany celebrates the manifestation of Christ by remembering the visit of the Magi and the baptism of Jesus. At this time new Christians were baptized and received into the faith, and so the early Church instituted a 40-day period of fasting and repentance.

Later, in the 6th century, Pope St. Gregory the Great was the first to associate this season of Advent with the coming of Christ. Originally it was not the coming of the Christ-child that was anticipated, but rather, the second coming of Christ.

By the Middle Ages the Church had extended the celebration of Advent to the familiar format we know today. The early weeks are rich with the prophecies of Isaiah, reminding us to wait and prepare for the coming Messiah. Later, the pace quickens and we focus more directly on the events leading up to Jesus' birth.



Jesus Comes in Human History

Our celebration of Christmas focuses on the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. The Christmas crèche at home or in the church, Christmas pageants and liturgies all help us recall the moment Jesus was born as a human being to live his destiny as the Son of God and our redeemer.

Jesus Comes in Our Hearts

Alive and among us through the Holy Spirit, Jesus continually reaches out to us. Advent renews our desire for the daily coming of Jesus as we recall the story of our salvation and look forward to the coming of the kingdom. We "wait in joyful hope," as the eucharistic liturgy says, for the coming of that kingdom.

Jesus Comes in Glory

The haunting melody and refrains of *O Come, O Come, Emmanuel* serve to remind us of our longing for the completion of Christ's reign at the end of time. This season gives special meaning to the phrase from the Lord's Prayer, "thy kingdom come."

ADVENT $F \cdot A \cdot Q$

What is the origin of the Advent Wreath?

The origin dates to pre-Christian Germany and Scandinavia where the people gathered to celebrate the return of the sun after the winter solstice. For us, the lighting of the Advent candles represents the promise of the coming of Jesus, the light of the world.

Why is the rose-colored candle lit on the third Sunday of Advent?

The third Sunday of Advent is known as *Gaudete Sunday* because in Latin, the first words of the opening antiphon for that day's Mass are *Gaudete in Domino semper* (Rejoice in the Lord always) from Philippians 4:4-5. On this Sunday a rose-colored candle is lit as a reminder that we are called to rejoice.

Was St. Nicholas Real?

Yes, St. Nicholas (270-343) was the Bishop of Myra (now Demre in southwest Turkey). He was imprisoned during Emperor Diocletian's persecution (303-5) and attended the first ecumenical council at Nicaea (325). Famous for his pastoral care, the many legendary stories of his charitable deeds became the basis for the figure of Santa Claus.

What is a Jesse Tree?

An ancient tradition revived in the mid-20th century as an Advent practice, the Jesse Tree represents the family of Jesse, father of King David. Each day of Advent a homemade ornament is added to the Jesse Tree, a small tree made of evergreen branches. These symbolic ornaments each represent a prophecy foretelling of Christ.
