OCIA Candidates and Catechumens—What’s the difference?

While you might hear the two terms used interchangeably at times, there is a difference!

Catechumens are those who are not baptized and seeking to become Catholic. They begin their preparation—known as the Pre-Catechumenate—no less than one year before they enter the Catechumenate. They then undergo formation and a series of rites with the parish community before receiving the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil Mass. If you are not baptized and want to know more, reach out to our OCIA team now!

Candidates are those who were baptized Christian but not Catholic and are seeking to come into Full Communion with the Catholic Church. They participate in formation to discern and learn more of the specific teachings of the Catholic faith while also participating in the life of the parish. Candidates can come into the Church as soon as they are ready, during any season. If you’re baptized and believe you need to wait until next Easter to come into the Church, you may be mistaken! Reach out to our team to learn more.

THE MADELEINE FAMILY REMEMBERS

William “Bill” Doctor

Funeral Rite • Friday, June 12, 11:00 am

A Funeral Rite will be celebrated for William “Bill” Doctor on Friday, June 12, 11:00 am, at The Madeleine.

Brigadier General (Ret.) William F. “Bill” Doctor passed away peacefully on May 15, 2026, surrounded by his loving family after a courageous battle with cancer. Throughout his illness, Bill faced his many medical challenges with quiet strength, grace, and few complaints, taking life one day at a time.

Born on July 26, 1940, in Albany, California, to John Doctor and Fay Franklin, Bill moved to Portland at the age of seven with his mother and his twin brother, Clyde. He attended Laurelhurst Elementary School, Beaumont Middle School, and Grant High School. Bill attended Portland State University for his undergraduate studies before earning his Master of Business Administration degree from the University of Portland.

Bill built a life grounded in service, leadership, and devotion to both family and country. He married and raised three children - John, Kim, and Heather - and worked as a computer programmer for 16 years while also dedicating himself fully to a distinguished military career. In 1984, Bill was blessed with his fourth child, Jennifer.

Over more than three decades of service in the Oregon Air National Guard and the United States Air Force, Bill earned deep respect for his integrity, steady leadership, and commitment to those he served alongside. Commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in December 1962, he held numerous operational and leadership assignments, including Radar Intercept Officer, Rescue Navigator and Instructor, Weapons Systems Officer, Deputy Commander, and ultimately Brigadier General for the Oregon Air National Guard. During his military career, he flew several aircraft, including the F-101B Voodoo and the F-4C Phantom II.

General Doctor played an instrumental role in strengthening the mission readiness and long-term success of the Oregon Air National Guard. Colleagues and service members alike admired not only his professionalism and strategic vision, but also

the mentorship and encouragement he offered throughout his career.

Even after retirement, Bill’s dedication to service continued. He worked as a consultant with the Oregon Air National Guard’s Strategic Initiatives Office and devoted more than twenty years to Oregon’s

Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve (ESGR), serving as Vice Chairman, Chairman, and Chairman Emeritus of the Oregon ESGR Committee.

Outside of his military career, Bill generously gave his time to numerous community organizations and volunteer efforts, including City Club, Meals on Wheels, Special Olympics, the American Red Cross, the Portland Rose Festival, and educational programs for students. In retirement, Bill and his wife Carol shared a love of travel and proudly visited all seven continents together.

General Doctor received many honors during his lifetime, including the Air Force Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Medal, and the State of Oregon Distinguished Service Award. Yet those closest to him will remember most his humility, kindness, strength of character, and unwavering dedication to others.

Bill is survived by his wife, Carol Laughlin; his twin brother, Clyde Doctor; his children, John Doctor, Heather Doctor-Laber, and Jennifer Laughlin; his grandchildren, Jonathan and Andrew Laber, and Matthew and Ashlie Doctor; and his great-grandchild, Auzriel Doctor. He was preceded in death by his parents and his daughter, Kim Doctor.

Offertory / Presentation of the Gifts —Changes On the Way

As we begin Ordinary Time in the liturgical church year, you might notice a subtle change in how things are done during the Offertory. All our gifts will be brought forward at the same time. As we read in the Roman Missal, "It is a praiseworthy practice for the bread and wine to be presented by the faithful. ... money or other gifts for the poor

or for the Church, brought by the faithful".

What does this mean? If you are one of our many volunteers (Thank you!) bringing the Bread and Wine forward, please continue to come to the back of the church as the Prayers of the Faithful are beginning. After the Ushers take the Collection, they will cue you to begin the Procession. The Bread and Wine are first in the procession followed by our monetary gifts and our food gifts.

THE FEAST OF THE BODY & BLOOD of Christ

(Corpus Christi)

Although we often gather to celebrate the Eucharist, it can sometimes become so familiar that we do not pay enough attention to what we are doing. So in 1264 Pope Urban IV instituted this feast to be celebrated on the Sunday after Trinity Sunday to help us highlight what the eucharist is and what it means for our lives. In many places today's celebration also includes a procession of the consecrated host which is then displayed for public adoration.

The Eucharist & Communion with Christ

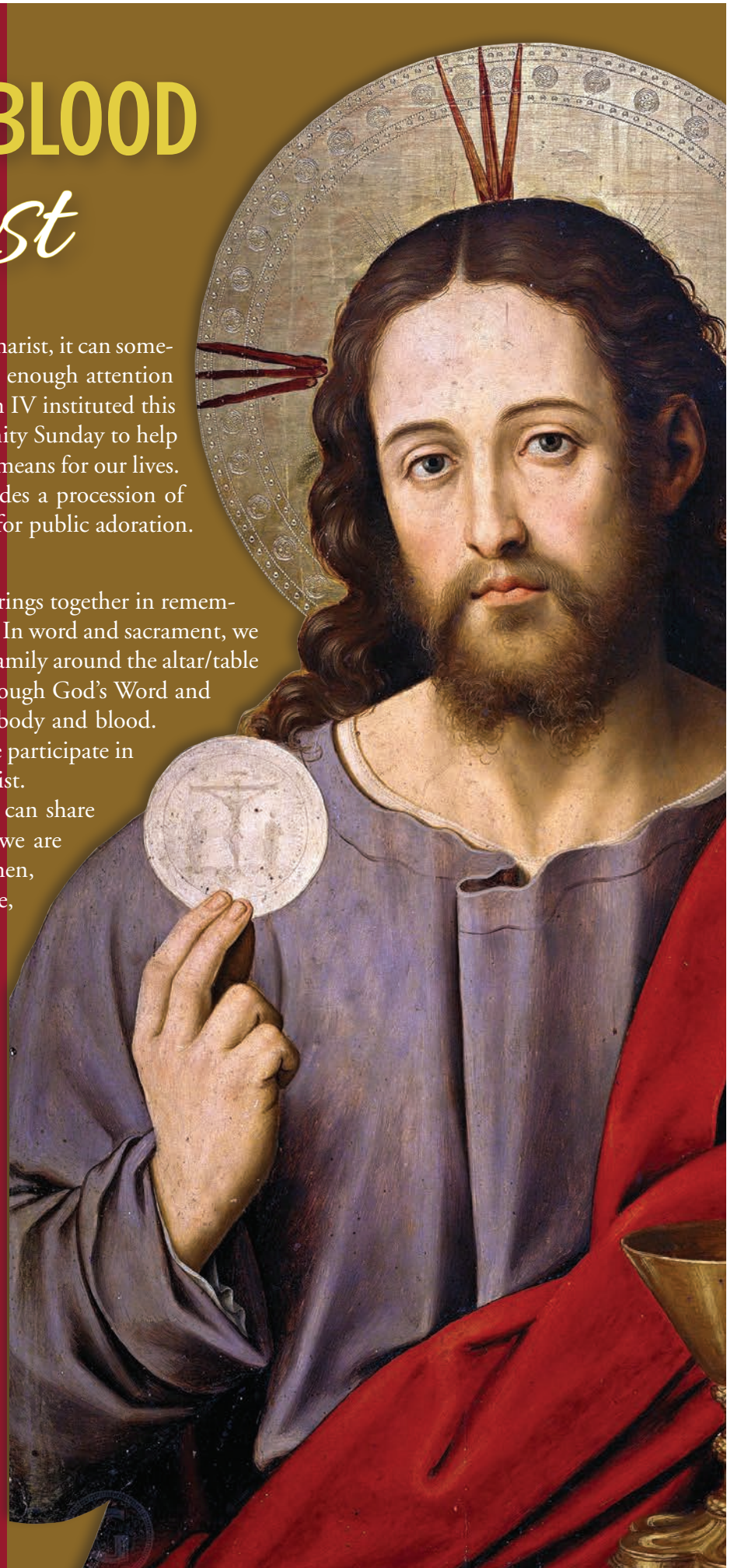
The Eucharist is our community ritual that brings together in remembrance and celebration our Christian identity. In word and sacrament, we gather together to express our unity as God's family around the altar/table where Jesus himself becomes present to us through God's Word and then as our consecrated bread and wine, his body and blood. By eating the bread and drinking the wine, we participate in a deep personal fellowship with the risen Christ.

Jesus becomes the bread and wine so we can share his divine life. By sharing in the Eucharist, we are at once joined to God and to one another. Then, strengthened by God's empowering presence, we go forth to share God's presence with all those we will meet throughout the week.

We Are the Body of Christ

St. Paul expresses this new reality by recognizing that the community actually becomes the new earthly Body of Christ (1 Cor 12) to continue Christ's ministry of building God's kingdom community on earth. The image of the body helps recall several important dimensions of our union with the risen Christ.

First, just as our soul gives life to our human body, so Christ gives spiritual life to the Church. Second, like the body, the Church is made up of many different parts, yet all are united and work together for the benefit of the whole person. And finally, the community becomes the eyes and ears, hands and feet through which Christ continues his work of drawing all creation into right relationship with God.



Living a Eucharistic Life

By inviting us into communion with himself, Jesus invites us into a lifetime process of maturing in our relationship with him and with others. Our task is to make sure that we begin, continue and increase this communion. Like Jesus, who gives himself to become our bread, we are called upon to give ourselves so that everyone might live more fully in relation to God and to one another. The Eucharist cannot be something we go to as spectators or do once a week and then forget about. As we celebrate it in a full, conscious and active way, we grow in our relationship with Jesus and with the Christian community.

Celebrating the Eucharist brings about changes in ourselves and then invites us to change our behavior in our household, in our school, in our work and in every other part of our life. As Christians, we not only pray the eucharist but we are called upon to live eucharistic lives. Just as Jesus took the bread, blessed and broke it to share with others, so we ask God to take us, bless us, break us and share us with others so that so that “through him, with him and in him” we may also become sources of God’s new life for the world.

“By faith you know that what seems to be bread is not bread but the body of Christ, although it tastes like bread. You also know that what seems to be wine is not wine but the blood of Christ although tastes like wine. By partaking of the body and blood of Christ, may you be made of the same body and same blood with him.”

We Give Ourselves as Jesus Gave Himself

“At the Last Supper Jesus gave his body and his blood in the bread and wine, to leave us the memorial of his sacrifice of infinite love. And filled with grace, the disciples had everything necessary for their journey through history, to extend to all the kingdom of God. The gift that Jesus made of himself, by his voluntary death on the cross, will be light and strength for them. And this bread of life has come down to us! The Eucharist enables us to abide in him, for it is the bond which unites us to him, it is the fulfillment of the covenant, the living sign of the love of Christ who humbled and lowered himself in order that we remain united.

“Jesus underlines that he has not come into this world to give something, but to give himself, his life, as nourishment for those who have faith in him. This our communion with the Lord obliges us, his disciples, to imitate him, making our existence, through our behavior, bread broken for others, as the teacher has broken the bread that is truly his flesh. Instead, this means for us generous conduct towards our neighbor thereby demonstrating the attitude of giving life for others. Every time that we participate in the holy Mass and are nourished by the body of Christ, the presence of Jesus and of the Holy Spirit act in us, shaping our hearts, communicating an interior disposition to us that translates into conduct according to the gospel.”



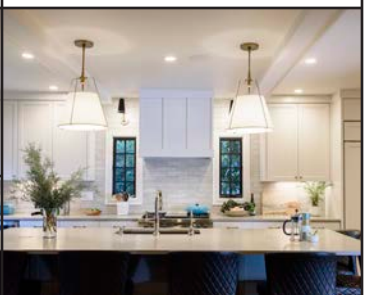
